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Description of the Entertainment given at the Palace of the Belvedere, on the 17th of April, 1770, by Order of their Imperial Majesties.

THEIR Majesties being desirous that the Public should partake in the Satisfaction they received from the Marriage of the Archduchess Antonia with the Dauphin, on the 15th of February last gave Orders to Baron Paccassi, their Counsellor and First Architect, to make Preparations for an Entertainment upon the Plan which he had proposed, which had been approved by them.

The seventeen great Rooms, and the Saloon which compose the principal Apartment of the Palace of the Belvedere, not being sufficient to answer the Views of their Majesties, whose Intention was, among other Things, to give a masked Ball to six thousand Persons, Baron Paccassi caused a Hall, four hundred Feet long, forty-eight wide, and forty-two high, to be built on the Ground-Floor near the Garden. The Vestible, in which is the Great Stair-case leading to the Apartments of the Palace, served, by descending a few Steps, for an Entrance to this new Hall, and made at the same Time a Communication with thirteen Rooms on the same Floor, which were made use of for Side-boards. This Hall was moreover so contrived, that you might see the whole Extent of it from three Balconies of the Palace supported by Pillars. Its Decoration consisted of Bowers with Porticos painted in Treillages, and covered with Foliages and Flowers; the Intervals of the Porticos afforded a distant View of delightful and varied Landscapes; eighty large Mirrors, and five hundred Crystal Sconces hung from Festoons and Garlands placed on each Side of the whole Length of the Hall; one hundred and fifty large Lustres were in like Manner suspended in the Middle of the Hall from Festoons of Gold and Silver Gauze, intermixed with Flowers coming from the Tops of the Bowers; and eight thousand wax Lights illuminated this great Room, on each Side of which was placed a Bench reaching the whole Length of the Room, covered with white Cloth, having a Border of Gold Lace; where there were also two Orchestras for 160 Musicians, in Balconies not quite so high as those of the Palace. The Number and Variety of the Masks, the Reflection of the Glasses, the Elegance and Freshness of the Paintings, the Richness of the Festoons, and the Brilliancy of the Illumination, afforded, altogether, a Sight equally charming and magnificent.

From the Hall you passed, on the same Floor, into thirteen Side-board Rooms, ornamented with Glasses, Sconces, Girandoles, Festoons, Garlands, &c.

The Vestible and Great Stair-case were ornamented in like Manner, and illuminated with an infinite Number of Wax-Lights; additional Decorations were made to the Saloon, and the seventeen Rooms of the Grand Apartment, by furnishing them with Seats like the Benches in the Hall, covered with white Cloth bordered with Gold, and by ornamenting them with Festoons and Garlands, from

which were suspended 95 large Chrysal Lustres, and 290 Sconces, holding in all, three thousand five hundred Wax-Lights. Three Orchestras in Balconies in the Saloon, and the two great Rooms adjoining, contained fourscore Musicians. Such were the Decorations within Side. It being scarcely possible to describe particularly the Taste and Magnificence of them, in order to give a general Idea, it is sufficient to say, there were one hundred thousand Italian Flowers made use of, one thousand Pieces of Gold Gauze, five hundred of Silver Gauze, two thousand eight hundred Books of Leaf Gold, fifteen thousand Ells of Cloth, for the Hangings of the New Hall; and that the Vestible, the Stair-case, the Halls, the other Rooms, and Sideboards, were illuminated by above thirteen thousand Wax-Lights. As to the Decoration of the Outside of the Palace, a large Edifice was erected at a little Distance from this Hall, towards the Gardens, of the Composite Order, with three Fronts, being four hundred Feet in Length, by one hundred and twenty in Height.

On the Pediment of the middle Front was the following Inscription:

Hymenæo
Ob Austriam cum Francia
Novo Vinculo junctam.

Over this Inscription were placed the Arms of the august House of Austria, supported by two Fames; underneath were little Cupids decked with Garlands, and bearing Quivers, Arrows, Flowers, and Branches of Laurel; and on the Top of the Balustrade, over the Pediment, on the two Sides of the Front, were two Figures of Hercules, one with a Globe representing Austria, the other with a Globe representing France. Genii, holding antique Vases, formed four Groups near these Globes. Other Genii adorned with Flowers, and holding Love's Torches, decorated the two Extremities of the middle Front. On the Pediment of one of the Side Fronts were Apollo and Bacchus; on the other Mercury and Vulcan. On the Top of these two Fronts, an Hymen, attended by several Genii carrying Flambeaux, Vases and Garlands, held up towards Heaven two Hearts united and encircled with a Wreath of Flowers. Lastly, the Galleries, which projected from the three Fronts, were ornamented in like Manner with Garlands and Trophies of Love and Hymen.

This whole Edifice was illuminated, in a Manner correspondent to its Architecture, by one Hundred Thousand Lamps; and the Figures, the Genii adapted to the Festival, the Trophies, Crowns, Garlands, and in general all the Ornaments, being distributed with Grace and Symmetry, produced an extraordinary Brilliancy, which made them, as well as the Flutings of the Pilastres and Capitals of the Columns, appear like so much burnished Gold.

The Stone-Steps, which reach the whole Width of the grand Terrace of the Garden, and by which you go down to it from the Palace, were illuminated at proper Distances by Fire-Pots: The Terrace was surrounded by a Gallery formed of Treillages and Arcades, disposed in such a Manner, that

in the Middle of each of them was one of the Stone Terms which adorn the Circumference of this large Spot: The Illumination of the Gallery, which we have just spoken of, was answerable to that of the Building: The Illumination of the Parterres was according to their Compartments; that of the Gravel-Plats formed a Kind of Mosaic, and the Basons were illuminated according to their Structure, as well as the Vases upon the Walls on each Side of the Terrace, which was illuminated in the Whole by one hundred and thirty thousand Terrines, Fire-Pots and Lamps, and presented a Prospect, which seemed to vie in Beauty with the Building itself.

Their Majesties and the Royal Family came down to the Terrace about Half an Hour after Ten in the Evening, being desirous to enjoy the Sight, which was enlivened by the Masks who entered this Part of the Garden in Crowds, by two Communications contrived in the New Hall.

Sumptuous as this truly Royal Entertainment was with respect to the Richness of the Illuminations, and the Magnificence of the Decorations in the Inside of the Palace, it was no less worthy of Admiration for the Regularity with which it was conducted, the astonishing Abundance which reigned there, and the Manner in which the Guests were served.

The Company entered by two different Ways, both ending at the Belvedere, and the Carriages returned by a Third; and the Populace, who were permitted to enter into the Gardens, which were divided by an Inclosure of the Terrace, came in at a fourth Way; so that there was no Possibility of Confusion. All these Entrances were enlightened by a very great Number of Lanthorns; and Parties of Dragoons and Hussars were posted at proper Distances, to keep Order and prevent Disturbances.

Thirteen Rooms, as above, were used for Side-Boards. They were furnished with every Delicacy that Imagination can suggest, in Meats, Poultry, and Game; Oglions, Chocolate, Coffee and Tea; Ices and Refreshments; Pastries and dry Sweetmeats of all Sorts; Oranges, and Fruits of every Kind; the most exquisite Wines of Tokay, Spain, Italy, Burgundy, Champagne, and the Rhine; and the Whole in so plentiful a Manner, that it was impossible to perceive the least Diminution in any Part, every Thing being instantly replaced; and nothing can equal the Attention, Readiness and Politeness with which their Majesties Officers distributed, without Distinction, every Thing that was called for, unless it be the great Elegance that reigned through the Whole. The Profusion was so great, that after the Feast was ended, enough was left to furnish out another, though there were present upwards of 12,000 Persons masked and unmasked. What remained was, by Order of their Majesties, distributed to the Soldiers on Guard at the Belvedere.

One essential Object of Attention, and which was not neglected, was the Danger to be apprehended from Fire. The most prudent Precautions were therefore taken. Fire-Engines were at hand ready to play; and 800 Men were stationed about the Great Hall, and in the other Apartments, most of whom were concealed in covered Niches, to be ready on the least Occasion; the rest had the Care of the Lights, which they renewed from Time to Time.

The Vigilance of her Imperial Majesty extended still farther. Nothing, in which the Good of her Subjects is concerned, escapes her Observation. Physicians and Surgeons attended, by her Order, with Medicines, in different Rooms, where Beds were prepared in case of Accidents.

Upon the Whole, the general Satisfaction was completed by the Appearance of their Majesties, and the Archdukes and Archduchesses, who passed several Times through the Rooms, and bestowed on all the Company Marks of that great Goodness and Affability, which so eminently distinguish them.

This Entertainment, as to what relates to the Interior of the Palace, was given under the Direction of Prince d'Auersperg, the Great Chamberlain; to whose particular Care and Attention are owing the Order, Magnificence, and Regularity, which reigned through the Whole; nor is less Merit due to Baron Paccassi, with regard to the Part which fell to his Share in this magnificent Entertainment.

Naples, April 17. Their Sicilian Majesties came from Caserta to this Capital, and assisted at the Ceremonies of the Holy Week, as usual. Yesterday the Court removed to Portici, where they will remain till the End of next Month.

Naples, April 24. The Duke of Dorset arrived here on Thursday last; and his Courier, a Piedmontese, having had some Words with the Master of the Ferry-Boat, who demanded more than his Due, at the Passage of the Garigliano, and these Words having produced Blows, the Ferryman deliberately fetched a Gun, which he presented at the Courier, who was then in the Boat with his Master; on this the Courier jumped out of the Boat, and screened himself behind some Peasants who were standing by, but the Ferryman still taking his Aim at the Courier, the latter ran up to him, who shot him dead upon the Spot. His Sicilian Majesty, being informed of this Transaction, immediately issued his Orders for apprehending the Ferryman; but it is most probable that he is fled into the Roman State.

Rome, April 21. The Empress of Russia has appointed Dr. Girardi, late Professor of Botany in this University, to be Consul for the Russian Nation at Naples. Her Imperial Russian Majesty has also appointed M. Manfredi Poet Laureat, with a Salary of 4000 Crowns per Annum.

On the 15th Instant, being Easter Sunday, the Pope, attended by the College of Cardinals, his whole Retinue, and the different Orders of the Clergy, performed the Functions of that Day at the Vatican; after which he gave the Benediction to a very great Number of People from the Balcony of the Vatican.

On the 16th Cardinal Pallavicini, the Secretary of State, entertained at Dinner Prince Xavier of Saxony, to which many Cardinals, the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, were invited. On the 19th Baron St. Odile entertained the Prince at Dinner a third Time, with several Ladies, &c. His Serene Highness is on his Departure for Naples; and, on his setting out from Fermo, he presented to the Cardinal Archbishop, and to the Governor of that Town, each a Gold Snuff-Box; to Count Spinucci a Gold Repeating Watch set with Diamonds, and another to the Countess, with two rich Brocade Suits of Cloaths, and a Pair of Diamond Ear-Rings; to the other Gentlemen and Ladies of the Family four Gold Repeating Watches set with Diamonds, and six Pieces of Brocade; to others three Gold Snuff-Boxes; and Pensions to divers Persons of that Family.

A few Days ago M. Bermundaz, the Spanish Agent, set out for Civita Vecchia, to receive from the Commander of a Spanish Frigate the Sum of 170000 Dollars for the Pensions of the expelled Spanish Jesuits in the Ecclesiastical State.

On the 14th the Princesses Pignatelli, Tablanowski, the Dutchess Strozzi, and the Countess Spinucci, were introduced by the Princesses Albani, Barberini, and Corsini, at the Church of Notre Dame des Graces, to kiss the Pope's Foot, who presented them with a Set of Beads with Gold Medals.

Florence, April 28. On the 21st Instant, in the Morning, the Great Dutchess was happily brought to Bed of a Princess, in the Palace of the Country; where, a few Hours after, the Nobility, the Foreign Ministers, the Great Officers of the Court, the Military Officers, &c. were invited to attend at the Christening; which was performed by the Archbishop

shop in the Ground-Hall of the said Palace prepared for that Purpose. She was baptized by the Names of Marianna, Ferdinanda, Giuseppa, Giovanna, Carlotta. The Archduke Ferdinand and the Archduchess Marianna were the Sponsors, represented by Count Rosenbergh and the Countess Thurn. Te Deum was sung under a triple Discharge of the Cannon of the Castles and of the Musquetry, and Couriers were dispatched to Vienna, Spain, Parma, Brussels, and Naples, with the News of this Event. There was Gala for three Days successively; and Fireworks were played off at the Old Palace in the Evenings.

Hamburg, May 4. His Royal Highness Prince Charles of Sweden, under the Name of Count Wafa, arrived here with his Suite this Afternoon from Estin, where he has been to see his Uncle the Prince Bishop of Lubeck. His Royal Highness intends to make but a short Stay in this City, and then continue his Route to Aix la Chapelle.
