

Navy-Office, October 16, 1770.

The Principal Officers and Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy give Notice, That all Bills registered on the Course of the Navy for the Months of October, November, and December, 1769, are ordered to be paid in Money; that such Persons, as are possessed thereof, may bring them to this Office to be assigned on the Treasurer of the Navy for Payment.

General Post-Office, Aug. 19, 1770.

This Morning, about Four o'Clock, the Post-Boy, carrying the Chester Mail from this Office, was attacked and robbed near the Six Mile Stone on Finckley Common, by a single Highwayman, who took out of the said Mail two Bags of Letters, ticketed Colspoil and Irish.

The Person, who committed this Robbery, is described to be rather a thin Man, about five Feet six Inches high, dressed in a dark brown close-bodied Coat, and well mounted on a very light Bay Gelding, about Fifteen Hands high, with a cut Tail.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed the said Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen: Or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the said Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery whereby the Person who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Person who committed this Robbery, be intitled to the said Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
