And as the General Payments in Great Britain and Ireland, at the End of the ensuing Six Months, are chiefly regulated by the Places of Residence mentioned by the Pensioners who are mustered at Chelsea in Person, and in the Body of the Affidavits of such who live at a Distance; it is hereby ordered and directed, that no Pensioner, who shall change the Place of his Abode given at his Muster, or specified in his Affidavit aforesaid, and who may apply for his Pension, except to the Officers of Excise nearest such Place of Abode, shall receive the same, unless it appear, by the Certificates of respectable Persons, that such Removal was through some unavoidable Necessity, which he or they could not foresee or prevent.

Lastly, it is notified, that none will be entered upon the Pay Lists of the said Hospital, or be thought intituled to receive any Benefit therefrom, who shall not act agreeable to these Orders and Directions.
