THIS Day, the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honourable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by Virtue of His Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of this Honourable House in the House of Peers, to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, the Lord President of the Council, the Lord Privy Seal, and several other Lords, therein mentioned, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to*

An Act for defraying the Charge of the Pay and Clothing of the Militia, in that Part of Great Britain called England, for one Year, beginning the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and seventy one; for indemnifying the Landholders of the Isle of Wight from the Payment of the Monies due by virtue of an Act of the Ninth Year of His present Majesty; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for the Encouragement of the White Herring Fishery.

An Act for consolidating, extending, and rendering more effectual, the Powers granted by several Acts of Parliament, for making, enlarging, amending, and cleansing, the Vaults, Drains, and Sewers, within the City of London and Liberties thereof; and for paving, cleansing, and lighting, the Streets, Lanes, Squares, Yards, Courts, Alleys, Passages, and Places, and preventing and removing Obstructions and Annoyances within the same.

An Act for paving, repairing, cleansing, lighting, and watching, the Streets, Squares, Lanes, and other Passages, within the Parish of St. John Clerkenwell, in the County of Middlesex; and for removing Obstructions and Annoyances therein.

An Act for improving and completing the Navigation of the Rivers Thames and Isis, from the City of London, to the Town of Cricklade, in the County of Wilts.

An Act for making a navigable Cut or Canal from Bradford, to join the Leeds and Liverpool Canal at Wakefield, in the Township of Idle, in the County of York.

An Act for cleansing and lighting the Streets of the Town of South Leith, the Territory of St. Anthony's and Yards Heads threunto belonging, and for supplying the several Parts thereof with fresh Water.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from the Town of Peebles to the King's Eattedge, and to Gatehope, Knapburnfoot, and to the Top of Minchmoor, and to Leck-head, in the County of Peebles.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Shelden to the Road between Cheddle and Leek, and from Bucknall to Weston Coyney; and from the Road between Cheddle and Leek, to the Turnpike Road above Frogall Bridge; and from the same Road to the Road between Blyth Marsh and Thorp, at or near Ruebill Gate, in the County of Stafford.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Stone to Lane End, and to the Road between Leek and Sandon on Meir Heath, and from thence to Blithe Bridge, and also from Meir to Trentham, and from thence to Stableford Bridge, in the County of Stafford.

An Act to continue and render more effectual two Acts passed in the Twelfth Year of the Reign of King George the First, and the Nineteenth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty, for repairing the Road from Market Harborough to Loughborough, in the County of Leicester; and for repairing, widening, turning, and altering the Road branching out of the aforesaid Road, at a Place called Filling Gate, to a Road called the Foss Road, and from thence to the Turnpike Road leading from Melton Mowbray to the Guide Post in Saint Margaret's Field, Leicester.

An Act to empower Sir John Gibbons to shut up the Foot Paths over certain Lands, in the Parish of Stanwell, in the County of Middlesex; and to extinguish all Claims and Right of Common in and over the said Lands; and to oblige the said Sir John Gibbons to make and keep in Repair a Foot Path in Lieu thereof; and to vest certain Premises and a Sum of Money in Trustees, for the Use of the Poor of the said Parish.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of an Act made in the Twenty-sixth Year of King George the Second, for repairing the Roads from Livingston, by the Kirk of Shotts, to the City of Glasgow, and by the Town of Hamilton, to the Town of Strathaven, and for repairing and widening the Road leading from the Centres of the County of Ayr, at or near Lochgate, to the Town of Strathaven, in the County of Lennox.

An Act for enlarging and altering the Term and Powers of several Acts, made in the Thirteenth Year of the Reign of King George the First, and in the Twenty-first Year of the Reign of King George the Second, for repairing the Road leading from the Town of Bromsgrove to the Town of Dudley in the County of Worcester, and from the said Town of Bromsgrove to the Town of Birmingham in the County of Warwick, so far as the said Acts relate to the repairing of the Roads leading from the said Town of Birmingham to the said Town of Bromsgrove.

An Act for repairing and widening the Roads from Hand Cross to Corner House, and from thence to the Turnpike Road leading from Evesham to Stuyning, and from Corner House aforesaid to a Maypole in the Town of Henfield in the County of Sussex.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from Patrick's Cross within the Town of Liverpool, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, to the Town of Preston, in the same County Palatine.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road from the Turnpike Road at Vinehill, in the Parish of Mountfield, in the County of Sussex, to Cripps's Corner, and from thence to Staple Cross, and to the Turnpike Road near the Windmill, in the Parish of Bechtley, and from Staple Cross to Longley's Water Corn-Mill at Kent Ditch, and from Cripps's Corner to the Town of Rye, in the said County.

An Act for repairing and widening the Road leading from Wem, in the County of Salop, to the Lime Rocks at Bromy Garth, and several other Roads in the Counties of Salop and Denbigh.

An Act for repairing, widening, and keeping in Repair, several Roads leading from Tavernerspite, to the Towns of Pembroke and Tenby, and to Hubberton Haking, in the County of Pembroke.

And to Thirty-three Private Bills.

Hamburg, April 23. We hear that the Lands of Forty-six Villages have been overflowed in the Lower Marthes of Brandenburg, by the Upper Elbe's having burst the Dykes in three Places, owing to the same Kind of Accident that occasioned the Overflowing of the Weser. Several of the Nobility

only were obliged to have recourse to their Gattets, and remained four Days without Assistance. They had no other Resource for saving their Cattle, but by driving them into the Apartments of the first Story. This Misfortune has ruined many Families, and increases that Distress which the uncommon Length and Severity of the Winter had univerfally spread in these Parts: The Prices of every Kind of Sufenance having risen so much in Proportion thereto, that many Peasants were under the Necessity of unthatching their Houses to maintain their Cattle.

St. James's, April 27, 1771.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to His Majesty, that on Tuesday the 16th of this Instant April, between the Hours of One and Two of the Clock in the Afternoon, Daniel Clark, of Artillery-Lane near Spital-fields, Pattern-Draveer, being in Company with another Person, was set upon, in a Street called Half Nicoll-Street, near Shoreditch Church, by two Men, having the Appearance of Weavers, who assaulted and beat the said Daniel Clark, and wounded him in the Face, and afterwards, being joined by other riotous Persons, pursued him into the House of one Mrs. Snee, a Warper, in Cock-Lane, Shoreditch, which House they endeavoured to force open, by throwing large Stones or Brickbats against the Door, and breaking and forcing in the Frames of the Windows, causing Destruction to the said Daniel Clark, for having given Evidence for the Crown, as they alledged, against some of the Cutters who were convicted at the Old-Baily Sessions last Year; and the said Daniel Clark having, soon afterwards, escaped into a Garage adjoining to the said House, was pursued by the said Persons and a great Mob, which was by this Time assembled, and was dragged by them through several Streets in Spital-fields and Shoreditch; and after having been most cruelly beaten and wounded, and his Cloaths torn off his Back, was thrown into a Pond, or Pit of Water, in a Field called Hare-Street Field, out of which he was, some Time, dragged forth, his Hands tied together, and then again thrown into the same Pit, and kept in the Water upwards of two Hours, during which Time he was most barbarously bruised and mangled by Stones and Brickbats thrown at him, and at length most cruelly murdered: His Majesty, for the Discovery and bringing to Justice of the lawless Villains concerned in this most horrid and inhuman Murder, is hereby pleased to offer His most gracious Pardon to any Person or Persons (except those immediately concerned in the said Daniel Clark's Death) who shall discover any one or more of the Persons who pursued the said Daniel Clark into the said Mrs. Snee's House, and endeavoured to force open the same, and afterwards dragged him from the said Garden, through the Publick Streets, to the aforesaid Pit of Water in Hare-Street Field, or who threw any Stones or Brickbats at the said Daniel Clark whilst he was in the said Pit of Water, so as such Person or Persons be apprehended and convicted of the said Murder: And His Majesty is also hereby graciously pleased to offer a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons (except as aforesaid) who shall discover, and be the Means of apprehending and convicting, any one or more of the inhuman Villains, who were guilty of the said Murder, to be paid by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury.

Note, A principal Actor in this horrid Scene, who first endeavoured to force open the said Mrs. Snee's Door, was a short, stout Man, round faced, wore a cut Wig and a blue Coat; and three of the most active Villains at the Pond are thus described; One in his Shirt, without Coat or Waistcoat on; another, a short Man, in a brown Coat; and a Third, in a green Waistcoat.

And whereas on Wednesday the 24th Instant, the Letter, of which the following is a Copy, was received by the Post by the said David Wilmot, Esq;

Mr Wilmot

April the 21. 1771

The letter you rec^d from me was a friendly warning to You to desist from any farther Concern in prosecuting some unhappy Persons who had taken that just revenge which the Law would not admit of. If you pretend that the Cruelty of the Act urged You to such a Measure what must You now think of Yourself who are endeavouring to take the Lives of several Persons who never did You any Injury, but who had received in their dearest Friends, & were likely to receive in their own Persons the most fatal Consequences (from a rash Step long since Committed and of which they repented) By that detestable late Object of their revenge who was thirsting after their blood not thro' any motive of justice but merely for Reward. This you know to be a true state of the Case, and yet you under the Cloak of humanity, are pursuing with the greatest Barbarity without having received the least prejudice those Persons whom you cannot but Allow had some essential Reasons for their proceedings. But know this very Villain that tis not the general custom in the Kings gift, that should attempt the means of detesting or deterring the writer of the Letters and his Associates in this Affair, from pursuing with indubitable & heart vent Revenge, their Designs against You should any one Person suffer from your duty Concern. & know further that having such connections at all your Launts, and free access at most Time to your Person, tis not the whole third Regiment of Guards that can protect You from the well concerted Plan for your Destruction. Therefore be wise if You Value your own Preservation and use your utmost endeavours to put an End to rather than promote this Prosecution, as we are now satisfied having put an End to the existence of that Monster in human Shape, the fear of whom kept several families in a starving Condition by keeping from them their principal Support thro' the Apprehension of being Informed against. But if you despise this advice and will persist in Your Cruel Design of farther depriving many poor families of their immediate Support (whose only Crime was self preservation the first Law of nature) Hear this! That in the Face of the almighty in the most Solemn Manner we do now Vow and Declare, that your Blood shall pay for this Savage temerity was the Danger in the Attempt ever so great, which on the Contrary is far from being so from our trusty Connections & well Disposd plan

P S. you may now apply to the King for a larger reward and try to what Purpose it will be.
