binty were bonged to have inclusives in their Garrets, and remained four Days without Affiliance. They had no other Refource for faving their Cattle, but by driving them into the Apartments of the first Story. This Misfortune has ruined many Families, and increases that Distress which the uncommon Length and Severity of the Winter had univerfally spread in these Parts: The Prices of every Kind of Sustenance having rifen so much in Proportion thereto, that many Peasants were under the Necessity of unthatching their Houses to maintain their Cattle.

## St. James's, April 27, 1771.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to His Majefty, that on Tuelday the roth of this Inflant April, between the Hours of One and I wo of the Clock in the Afternoon, Daniel Clark, of Artillery-Lane near Spital-fields, Pattern-Drawer, being in Company with another Perfon, was let upon, in a Street called Half Ni-coll-Street, near Shoreditch Church, by two Men, having the Appearance of Weavers, who offaulied and beat the faid Daniel Clark, and wounded him in the Face, and afterwards, being joined by other riotous Perfons, purfued him into the Houfe of one Mrs. Snee, a Warper, in Cock-Lane, Shoreditch, which Haule they endcawoured to force open, by throwing large Stones or Brickbats against the Door, and breaking and forcing in the Frames of the Windows, vowing Deflouction 10 the faid Daniel Clark, for having given Évident for the Crown, as they alledged, against fime of the Cut-ters who were convicted at the Oid-Baily Seffions last Year; and the faid Daniel Clark having, joon afterwards, escaped into a Garaen adjoining to the Juid House, was pursued by the said Persons and a great Mob, which was by this Time assembled, and was dragged by them through feveral Streets in Spitch-field. and Shoreditch; and after bawing been most cruelt; beaten and wounded, and bis Cloaths tern off his Back, was thrown into a Pond, or Pit of Water, in a Field called Hare-Street Field, out of which he was, after fome Time, dragged forth, his Hands tied toget be: and then again thrown into the fame Pit, and kept in the Water upwards of two Hours, during which Time be was most barbarously bruised a :d mangled by Stones and Brickbats thrown at him, and at length most cruelly murdered: His Majelly, for the Discovery and bring-ing to Justice of the lawless Villains concerned in this most borrid and inhuman Murder, is hereby pleased to offer His most gracicus Parden to any Person or Persons (except those immediately concerned in the faid Daniel Clark's Death) who shall discover any one or more of the Persons who pursued the Said Daniel Clark into the faid Mrs. Snee's Houfe, and endeavoured to force open the fame, and afterwards dragged him from the faid Garden, through the Publick Streets, to the aforefaid Pit of Water in Hare-Street Field, or who threw any Stones or Brickbats at the faid Daniel Clark whilft be was in the faid Pit of Water, fo as fuch Perfon or Perfons be apprehended and convicted of the faid Murder : And His Majesty is also bereby graciously phased to offer a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to a Reveate of Otta HORDRED 100105 10 any Perfon or Perfons (except as aforefaid) who shall discover, and be the Means of apprehending and con-victing, any one or more of the inhuman Villains, who were guilty of the faid Murder, to be paid by the Right Honorable the Lords Commifficners of His Majesty's Treasury. ROCHFORD.

Note, A principal Actor in this borrid Scene, who first endeavoured to force open the said Mrs. Snee's Door, was a short, stout Man, round faced, wore a cut Wig and a blue Coat; and three of the most active Villains at the Pond are thus described; One in his Shirt, without Coat or Waistcoat on; another, a short Man, in a brown Coat; and a Third, in a green Waistcoat.
