An Act for the better pawing, cleansing, lighting, and watching, Haydon Square, the New Square, Hay-don Yard, Sheepy Yard, Church Street, Little Church Street, otherwife The Ghurch Paffage, Church Court, and Kenton Street, and the Paffages therein or leading thereunto, in the Parish of Trinity, otherwise Holy Trinity, in The Minories, in the County of Middlefex, within the Liberty of His Majefty's Tower of London; and for other Purpofes therein mentioned.

An Act for pawing and keeping in Repair the Streets, Lanes, and PajJages, in the Parish of St. Luke; in the County of Middlefex; for removing Obstructions and Annoyances therein; and for widening the Paffages at the Weft End of Chifwell Street, and at the South End of Brick Lane, in the faid Parifs; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for amending and widening the Road from Beffelfleigh through Wantage to Hungerford, in the County of Berks, and from Wantage to Marlborough in the County of Wilts, and from the Turnpike Road between Reading and Walling ford, through Halfpenny Lane, to the Old Red Houfe upon Wantage Downs, and from thence to Lamborn, in the faid County of Berks.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of Three Acts paffed in the Twelfth Year of King George the First, and the Nineteenth and Twenty-fixth Years of bis late Majefly, for repairing the Road from Liverpool to Prefcott, and other Roads in the County Palatine of Lancaster, and for amending the Road from the Causeway at Blacklow Brow, to the Caufeway leading from Prefcott to Liverpool, and also through Lime Kiln Lane to Ranelagh House in Liverpool aforefaid. And to Ten Private Bills.

After which His Majefty was pleafed to make the following most gracious Speech :

My Lords, and Gentlemen, S the State of Public Business no longer requires your Attendance, I think it right, at this Seafon of the Year, to put an End to the pre-fent Seffion of Parliament.

The Satisfaction I have obtained from his Catholic Majefty, for the Injury I had received, together with the Proofs which the Courts of France and Spain have given Me, by laying afide their Armaments, of their fincere Difpolition to preferve the general Tranquillity of Europe, have enabled Me to reduce My Forces by Sea and Land. The Zeal with which you have exerted yourfelves, upon the Apprehension of a Rupture with Spain, must convince the World of your affectionate Attachment to Me. and of your conftant Regard for the true Interefts of your Country. On that Support I shall always rely for the Defence of My Honour, and for the Security of the Rights of My People.

With regard to the Troubles which still agitate fome Parts of the Continent, My Endeavours have never been wanting to bring them to an End; and in those Endeavours, you may be affured, I shall perfevere.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

It was with real Concern that I found Myfelf c:lled upon, by the Situation of Public Affairs, to alk of My faithful Commons more than ordinary Supplies for the Service of the current Year; and I cannot fufficiently thank you for the Unanimity, Chearfulnefs, and Public Spirit, with which they have been granted.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

While We acknowledge the Goodnefs of Divine Providence in preferving Us from those Calamities with which some Parts of Europe have been afflicted, let Me exhort you to employ your best Endeavours, in your feveral Stations and Countries, to render the national Happiness compleat, by discouraging and suppressing all groundless Suspicions and domeffic Diffurbances. I have no other Object, and I can have no other Interest, than to reign in the Hearts of a free and happy People : And it is My earnest Wish, that My Subjects may not be prevent-

ed, by any Millakes or Animolities amongst themfelves, from enjoying, in the fullest Extent, the Bleffings of a mild and legal Government. The Bleffings of a mild and legal Government. Support of Our excellent Conflictation is Our common Duty and Intereft : By that Standard I would with My People to try all Public Principles and Profeffions; and to look upon those as their most dangerous Enemies, who, under any Pretence whatfoever, would perfuade them to violate those Laws, and undermine that Authority, which the Conflitution has provided for the Purpole of preferving the general Liberty and Happiness.

Then the Lord Chancellor, by His Majefty's Command, faid;

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

IT is His Majesty's Royal Will and Pleasure, that this Parliament be prorogued to Tuesday the 23d Day of July next, to be then bere held; and this Parliament is accordingly prorogued to Tuesday the 23d Day of July next.
