An AA for Punishing fuch Persons as shall do Injuries and Violences to the Persons or Properties of His Majesty's Subjects, with Intent 10 hinder the Exportation of Corn.

An AA to repeal an AA, intitled, An AA for the Relief of Debtors, with respect to the Imprisonment of their Persons.

An AA for reviving, continuing, and amending feveral temporary Statutes, and for other Purpofes.

An AA to explain and amend an AA, paffed in the Fifth Year of His Majefly King George the Third, intitled, An AA for amending the Publick Roads.

An AA to enable the Speaker of the House of Commons to iffue his Waxrants to make out new Writs for the Choice of Members to serve in Parliament, in the Room of such Members as shall die during the Recefs of Parliament.

An AA to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Ireland, and to binder the Spreading of Infection.

binder the Spreading of Infection. An Act to regulate the Trials of controverted Elections, or Returns of Members to Jerve in Parliament.

An All for continuing certain Laws, heretofore made for the Improvement of His Majefly's Revenue, and the more effectual preventing Frauds therein. And to One Private Bill.

And then his Excellency was pleafed to make a Speech to both Houfes of Parliament, which is as follows :

My Lords and Genilemen,

I Cannot put an End to this Seffion of Parliament, without returning you my fincerest Thanks for the great Dispatch which you have given to the Publick Business.

The many good Laws which have now received the Royal Affent, are the most honourable Proofs of the faithful Performance of your important Duty, and of your fuccefsful Solicitude for the Happiness of your Country.

In the fhort Interval between this and the next Meeting of Parliament, you will confider what may be further done to promote the Welfare and Profperity of this Kingdom.

The Laws for making out new Writs for the Choice of Members to ferve in Parliament, and for regulating the Tryals of controverted Elections, have, I flatter myfelf, nearly compleated the great Improvement made in your Conflictution by the Bill for limiting the Duration of Parliaments; and I had a particular Satisfaction in giving the Royal Affent to that for the better Performance of Quarantine, the Importance of which towards fecuring the Lives of His Majeffy's Subjects, is fo great and vifible, that I cannot doubt of its being duly and faithfully carried into Execution.

I congratulate with you upon the Profpect, which, by His Majefty's Wifdom and Magnanimity, we now have, of the general Tranquility of Europe, in which this Kingdom is, at all Times, effentially interested.

By the Continuance of this great Bleffing you will be fully at Leifure to give your Attention to the Industry, Morals and Religion of the People, and to a regular and virtuous Observance and Execution of the Laws.

Your Regard to those great Objects, in your feveral Situations, will be the most acceptable Return you can make to His Majesty for His Tenderness and Humanity to His People, in preferving them from the dreadful Calamities of War, and in continuing to them every Bleffing of Peace and Liberty under the best Laws and the mildest Government.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

Notwithstanding a confiderable unforeseen DeSciency in the Supplies granted last Session of arliament, I have adhered to my Refolution of nos calling upon you, at this Time, for any further Aid, being determined to shew that His Maj-sty's gracious Intention in affembling you together was folely in Compliance with the Wifhes of His People, and not for the Purpole of alking new Supplies : I know you have, at all Times, the ftrongest Dispositions to support His Majesty's Government; Experience has given me the best grounded Confidence in your Duty and Loyalty, and I am perfuaded that in the next Seffion, when there will be more Time and a better Opportueity to take this Subject into your Confideration, you will make every proper Provision for His Majesty's Service, and for the internal Welfare and Improvement of your Country.

My Lords and Genilemen,

Your obliging Approbation of my Conduct. and the Satisfaction you express at my Refigence among & you, are very acceptable to me. I am happy in this Circumstance, as it has enabled me, from my own Knowledge, to declare the unfhaken Zeal of F is Majefty's faithful Subjects of Ireland for the Honor and Dignity of His Crown, their inviolable Attachment to his Perfon, Family, and Government, and their conftant and affectionate Regard for their Country; all which I shall continue to reprefen in the fullest and most faithful Manner. It is my Duty to preferve entire the most confidential Intercourfe between our excellent Sovereign and his Perple of this Kingdom; let it be your's, on your Rate to your feveral Counties, to difcountenance and ω_{-} at every Attempt that may be made a Billurb the Minds of the People with groundlefs Supicion and Distrust; and I earnestly recommend it to you to use your best Endeavour to promote Concord Har-mony, and that firm True in Government, 10 effentially neceffary to the Tranquillity, Happiness, and true Interest of this Kingdom.
