

*An Act for Punishing such Persons as shall do Injuries and Violences to the Persons or Properties of His Majesty's Subjects, with Intent to hinder the Exportation of Corn.*

*An Act to repeal an Act, intituled, An Act for the Relief of Debtors, with respect to the Imprisonment of their Persons.*

*An Act for reviving, continuing, and amending several temporary Statutes, and for other Purposes.*

*An Act to explain and amend an Act, passed in the Fifth Year of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled, An Act for amending the Publick Roads.*

*An Act to enable the Speaker of the House of Commons to issue his Warrants to make out new Writs for the Choice of Members to serve in Parliament, in the Room of such Members as shall die during the Recess of Parliament.*

*An Act to oblige Ships more effectually to perform their Quarantine, and for the better preventing the Plague being brought from Foreign Parts into Ireland, and to hinder the Spreading of Infection.*

*An Act to regulate the Trials of controverted Elections, or Returns of Members to serve in Parliament.*

*An Act for continuing certain Laws, heretofore made for the Improvement of His Majesty's Revenue, and the more effectual preventing Frauds therein.*

And to One Private Bill.

And then his Excellency was pleased to make a Speech to both Houses of Parliament, which is as follows :

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

I cannot put an End to this Session of Parliament, without returning you my sincerest Thanks for the great Dispatch which you have given to the Publick Business.

The many good Laws which have now received the Royal Assent, are the most honourable Proofs of the faithful Performance of your important Duty, and of your successful Sollicitude for the Happiness of your Country.

In the short Interval between this and the next Meeting of Parliament, you will consider what may be further done to promote the Welfare and Prosperity of this Kingdom.

The Laws for making out new Writs for the Choice of Members to serve in Parliament, and for regulating the Tryals of controverted Elections, have, I flatter myself, nearly compleated the great Improvement made in your Constitution by the Bill for limiting the Duration of Parliaments; and I had a particular Satisfaction in giving the Royal Assent to that for the better Performance of Quarantine, the Importance of which towards securing the Lives of His Majesty's Subjects, is so great and visible, that I cannot doubt of its being duly and faithfully carried into Execution.

I congratulate with you upon the Prospect, which, by His Majesty's Wisdom and Magnanimity, we now have, of the general Tranquility of Europe, in which this Kingdom is, at all Times, essentially interested.

By the Continuance of this great Blessing you will be fully at Leisure to give your Attention to the Industry, Morals and Religion of the People, and to a regular and virtuous Observance and Execution of the Laws.

Your Regard to those great Objects, in your several Situations, will be the most acceptable Return you can make to His Majesty for His Tenderness and Humanity to His People, in preserving them from the dreadful Calamities of War, and in continuing to them every Blessing of Peace and Liberty under the best Laws and the mildest Government.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

Notwithstanding a considerable unforeseen Deficiency in the Supplies granted last Session of Parliament, I have adhered to my Resolution of not calling upon you, at this Time, for any further Aid, being determined to shew that His Majesty's gracious Intention in assembling you together was solely in Compliance with the Wishes of His People, and not for the Purpose of asking new Supplies: I know you have, at all Times, the strongest Dispositions to support His Majesty's Government; Experience has given me the best grounded Confidence in your Duty and Loyalty, and I am persuaded that in the next Session, when there will be more Time and a better Opportunity to take this Subject into your Consideration, you will make every proper Provision for His Majesty's Service, and for the internal Welfare and Improvement of your Country.

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*

Your obliging Approbation of my Conduct, and the Satisfaction you express at my Residence amongst you, are very acceptable to me. I am happy in this Circumstance, as it has enabled me, from my own Knowledge, to declare the unshaken Zeal of His Majesty's faithful Subjects of Ireland for the Honor and Dignity of His Crown, their inviolable Attachment to his Person, Family, and Government, and their constant and affectionate Regard for their Country; all which I shall continue to represent in the fullest and most faithful Manner. It is my Duty to preserve entire the most confidential Intercourse between our excellent Sovereign and his People of this Kingdom; let it be your's, on your Return to your several Counties, to discountenance and deter every Attempt that may be made to disturb the Minds of the People with groundless Suspicion and Distrust; and I earnestly recommend it to you to use your best Endeavour to promote Concord, Harmony, and that firm Trust in Government, so essentially necessary to the Tranquility, Happiness, and true Interest of this Kingdom.

After which the Lord Chancellor, by his Excellency's Command, said;

*My Lords and Gentlemen,*
