Madame, Madame Elizabeth, and Mefdames, ranged themfelves on each Side as ufual. The Count and Counters of Provence, entring the Chapel, advanced to the Bottom of the Altar, and kneeled down on a Cufhion placed on the Steps of the Chan-cel: The Archbifhop of Rheims, Great Almoner, who came out of the Veftry the Moment the King entered the Chapel, prefented his Majesty with Holy Water, and then went up to the Altar, which the King and Royal Family approached : This Prelate, after addreffing a Difcourfe to the Count and Countels of Provence, began the Ceremony by the Benediction of Thirteen Pieces of Gold, and of a Golden Ring : He prefented them to the Count de Provence, who put the Ring on the Fourth Finger of the Left Hand of the Countefs, and gave her the Thirteen Pieces of Gold. The Marriage Ceremony being finished, and the Count and Countels of Provence having received the Nuptial Benediction, the King returned to his Seat, and the Great Almoner began Mafs, during which the King's Band performed a Piece of Mufick fuitable to the Occafion, composed by the Abbé de Gau-zargues, Matter of Musick to his Majesty's Chapel. After the Offertory, the Count and Counters of Provence went to the Offering, and at the End of the Pater a Canopy of Silver Brocade was fpread over their Heads, fupported, on the Prince's Side, by the Bithop of Limoges, his First Almoner, and on the Princess's Side by the Abbé de Mo-flueges, her First Almoner; which was not removed till the Great Almoner had finished the Prayers. When Mafs was ended, the Great Almoner went to the King's Seat, and prefented to Majefty the Register of the Marriages of the Royal Parish, which the Curate, who assisted at the Marriage, had brought with him. The King, attended by the Royal Family, returned to his his Apartment in the fame Manner as had been observed in going to the Chapel.

As foon as the Countefs of Provence was in her own Apartment, the Duke de Duras, First Lord of the Bedchamber in Waiting, had the Honour of delivering to her the Key of a Box of Jewels, which the King had ordered the Duke to lend to her Apartment .- On their Return from Mafs the principal Officers of the Counters's Household had the Honour of taking the usual Oath, in the Pre-fence of the Duc de la Vrilliere.

The Ambaffadors and Foreign Ministers had the Honour to be prefented to the Countefs of Pro-vence by the Dutchefs of Brancas. The Lords and Ladies of the Court, who were not at Fontainbleau on her Arrival, had the fame Honour the next Day

About Six o'Clock in the Evening the King, attended by the Royal Family, and the Princes and Princestes who were at the Marriage, had a Drawing in the Great Gallery, and afterwards fupped in l'ublick in the Saloon, which was pre-pared for the Royal Festival. Several Pieces of Mufick were performed during the Feftival, under the Conduct of Monf. Rebel, Knight of the King's Order, and Superintendant of the Mufick.

After the Feaff, the King conducted the Count and Counters of Provence to their Apartment, and the Archbishop of Rheims, Great Almoner, pronounced the Benedicion of the Bed.

The 16th Inflant, the Magifirates of the City of Paris, in their Robes, with the Duc de Chevreuse, had the Honour to compliment the Count and Countefs of Provence, on Occasion of their Marriage, and to offer them the ufual Prefents. Monf. Bignon, Provost of the Merchants, made a Speech in the Name of the Magistrates and City; they were conducted to the Audience of the Count and Countels of Provence by the Marquis de Dreux, Grand Massier, the Sieur Lallemant de Namouillet, Masser, and the Sieur de Watronville, Assistant Master of the Ceremonies.

The next Day, about Six in the Evening, the King and Royal Family went to the Play house, where the Opera of the Queen of Golconda was performed ; after which his Majefty was prefent

at a Fire-work played off on the Occasion, and supped in Publick.

Merchants at Koningsberg, Riga and Narva, setting forth the healthy State of those Places, and the Regulations observed for the general Security ; as also a Letter from feveral of the principal Merchants refiding at Dantzick, reprefenting, that the contagious Distemper, which made it's Appearance last Year, in fome Parts of Poland, is entirely fubfided, the Truth whereof is certified under the Hand and Seal of His Majelly's Confui at Dantzick :--His Majetly, taking the tame into Confideration, and being defirous to remove all Rethraints upon Trade, fo far as may be confiftent with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleafed, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, That the Quarantine at prefent fubfilling upon all Ships from Dantzick, or any other Port or Place in Royal and Ducal Pruffia, Pomerania, Samogitia, Courland, and Livonia, be taken ofF; and that all Ships and Vefic's already arrived, or that may hereafter arrive, from those Places, be permitted to difcharge their respective Ladings, withort unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine : Provided that they have no Cotton-Wool on Board ; that they bring with them clean Bills of Health ; and that the Mafter, or other Perfon taking Charge of fuch Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Costom-House Officer, or Chief Magidrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that the Crews are free from all Infection :- And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of H s Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant General and the reft of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, his Majefly's Secretary at War, and the Governor or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the Ifles of Jerfey, Guernfey, War rey, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them and the formation of the them may respectively apportant,

HEREAS His Majefty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the tft of November laft, to direct, that all Ships and Veffels whatfoever, having Rags or Cotton-Wool on Board, should per-form a Quarantine of Forty Days—And whereas, the better to prevent the Infolion then raging in fome Parts of Poland, from being brought into this Kingdom, His Majesty was pleased, by a sublequene Order in Council of the 9th of December lait, to to direct, that all Ships coming from Hamburgh or Bremen, and having Rags, Cotton-Wool, Hemp or Flax, or Human Hair, or Feathers on Board, fhould likewife perform a Quarantine of Forty Days And whereas there was this Day read at the Board the humble Petition of a Committee appointed at a very numerous Meeting of the Paper Manufacturers of this Kingdom, humbly praying, for the Reafons therein
