

therein contained, that all Ships coming from Hamburg, Bremen, and the Ports of Flanders, bringing Rags, and producing Bills of Health for the Crew and Cargo, may be admitted at the Custom-House to report, without performing Quarantine—His Majesty, taking the said Petition into Consideration, and it appearing, by a Certificate from His Majesty's Consul at Bantack, that the contagious Distemper, which made its Appearance last Year in some Parts of Poland, is entirely subdued, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that all Ships and Vessels already arrived, or that may hereafter arrive, from Hamburg, Bremen, or the Ports of Flanders, be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine: Provided that they have no Cotton-Wool on Board; that they bring with them clean Bills of Health from such Places where Certificates of Health are granted; and that the Master, or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel do first make Oath before the Custom House Officer, or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that the Crews are free from all Infection. And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great-Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being, of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.
