Cracow, July 16. Y Letters from famorow, of the 21 instant, we have an account, that the King after having kad seven Fits of an Ague, was quite recovered of it; that the Queen intended in few dayes to begin her journey down the Vistule to Dantzick, and from thence to continue it to France, to the Waters at Bourbon, for the recovery of her health. Queens departure, the King would part immediately for Leopold, to put himself at the head of his Forces. The Letters add, That the Staroftie of Culm having been abroad with a Party of Horse and Foot, had defeated 1500 Tastars, most of which were killed, and the rest taken Prisoners; and that understanding from these, that there was another Party of 3000 Tartats, who were earrying a great Booty, and many Christian Slaves to their Camp, he marched after them, and had the good fortune to furprize them, and totally to rout them, recovering the faid Christians, and most of the other Purchase they had made.

Rome, Aug. 1. Since the death of the late Pope Clement X. the Colledge of Cardinals have held feveral Congregations to order matters concerning the new Election. The 25 path, the Pope was Interred in St Pezer's Church with the usual Solemnity. To morrow the Cardinals will enter into the Conclave.

Vienna, Ang 9. We are cold that the Emperor will not declare his intended marriage, till after the conclustion of this Campagne. The Rebels in Hungary are very croubleforn, and pretend to be affifted by the Ottomars for that the Emperor will be obliged to reinforce his I roops in those parts.

Corenhagen, Aug. 11. The 8th instant, arrived here Colonel Schonevelt with 17 Companies of Foot, with which he will pass over into Schonen, where the Castle of Landseron holds out still. The Besiegers batter it from seven Batteries, and very much annoy the Besieged with their Bombes and Granadoes; who, notwishstanding, make so vigorous a defence, that if they had men enough to make strong Sallies, it is thought they would entertain the Besiegers some time longer. A Party of Dunes have been as far as Christianstadt, where they met with a good Booty, having, among other things, taken the King of Stedens own Tent.

Stade, Aug. 13. Yesterday morning the Maveschal Horne. late Governor of the Dutchy of Bremen souther King of Sueden, having finally concluded the Treaty with the Allies for the delivering up of this place, took his solemn leave of the Civil Magistracy and Burghers; which done, the Germans, that had been in the Suedes service; were disbanded, the Horsemen and Dragooms being permitted to keep their Horses and Arms, and the Foothaving some money given them. In the afternoon the Burghers came in Arms, and took possession of the Gates and Posts which the Suedes had quitted. This morning, about 8 of the Clock, 1500 Lunenburghs entred the Town, placing two Companies at the High Gate upon which the Burghers retired from thence to the Market-place; at the same time the Mareschal Horne marched out on Horseback, accompanied with

about 30 Horsemen, and was followed an hour after by the Suedish Soldiers, who consisted in siven Computies, and together made about 750 men. The Artillers they are to take with whem, viqtwo Half-Cannon, four Field pieces, and one Mortar-piece, stand ds yet on the Fish Marker. The Suedes are to refresh themselves for 14 dayes in the Oudelands, and then are to be Transported to Stockholme.

Hamburgh, Aug. 18. On Friday last hapned here a very great Fire, which burnt towards the Water-side, and put the ships in great danger, is being about Low-water, but the Flood coming it, saved tem; we recken about Forty considerable Houses have been burnt, and the whole loss that has been sustained, may amount to above too ooo!, steel. From Pomeren they write, That Anclum holds out still, though the Elector pretends to be possessed in the continue on the Coast of Pomeren.

From the Camp before Philipsburg, Aug. 154 Upon the News we received of the Retreat of the French Army, we gave three Salvo's of all our great and small shor, to notific the same to the Besieged; and on Wednesday last, a Summons was fent to the Governor of the place, to surrender the same: To which he answered, That it was not yet time to talk of that. In the mean time we batter the Town from our Cannon and Mortar-pieces without intermission, and at the same time we are Mining a Rave in which lies before the Wall of the Town, which we shall attack to morrow or next day; and doubt not to be Masters of the place in 8 or 10 days.

Spire, Aug. 15. The Duke of Luxem' urgh finding he could not effect his design to relieve Philipsburg, the 10 instant, in the afternoon, caused his In antry to decamp, and to march back towards Landaw, following the next morning early with all his Cavarry. Retrear, the French burnt the Village of Belikum, and obliged the Town of Landin to pay them 2000 Ryxdollars, an i besides to furnish a great quantity of Corn, to exempe them from the like Trea menr. The 13 instant, the Enemy encamped between Weissenburg and Lauterburg, the Head-quarter being at St Rhemy, and intentied to remove again from thence the next day. They take great marches, and it is this that they are going to beliege Friburg in Brifgow; and that in order to it, they will pass the Rhine at Brisic, or else lay a Bridge over the River a little above strasburg; whereupon 8000 Horse have been detached from the Imperal Camp under the command of Caprara and Schuliz, who have passed the Rhine, and will march towards Friburg; to observe the Enemy. In the mean time Philipsburgh is attacked with all the vigor possible, these 4 or 5 days past have been spent its buttering the place, advancing the Trenches, and Mining the Enemies works. The Duke of Lorrain is there in person, and most of the Imperial Infunity will now be employed in order to the speedy teduction of the place, which cannot hold out long, though hitherto the Governor continues yery oblidate in the defence of its

Cologne, Aug. 18. From Strasburgh they write, That the Brench having given overall thoughts of succouring Philipsburg, Philipsburgh, were coming back towards Haguenaw, and that it was reported that the Duke of Luxemburg intended, by some considerable Action, to give the Imperialists a diversion. A Philipsburg in the mean time continues to make a good desence, and it's believed the place will hold out yet these 14 dayes. From Lipstadt they give us an account, That stade was finally furrendred to the Duke of Zell, and that thereupon the Bilhop of Munster had given orders for some of his Forces to part towards the Rhine, and it's faid that the Vanguard of them is alrea y arrived at Wefel. .

From the Campibefore Maestricht, Aug. 15. The 13 instants in the morning, the Enemy made a Sally, to beat us out of the Lodgment we had made on the Counterscarp on the right hand of the Dauphins Bassion; that night, and the next morning, they made several other efforts to the same purpose, yet without any effect, though feveral men were killed on both fives: fince they have not at all disturbed us, and we have quietly kept our Posts as well there, as on the Left fide of the faid Bastion, have made a Line of Communication, and enlarged our Lodgments as far as the Palifadoes of the Counterscarp. We have likewise brought on the Miner, in order to his passing through, under the covered way, to the right fide of the Hornwork, towards the Bolduc Gate, to Mine it; & though he was come this noon to the Ditch of the same, it will require yet 2 days to get under the work. We have raised three Batteries, one on the Dauphins Bastion, and the other on each side, under the favour of which, and of our Mines, we hope in 2 or 3 dayes to at-/ tack the Horn-work, and the Ravelin. Last night the Rhingrave was wounded with a Musket-shorthough, we hope, without danger.

From the same Canis, Aug. 17. Since mine of the 15, we have advanced with pretty good success; the last night the Count of Solms, who had the Watch with the Regiment of Guards, carried on the Trenches 60 paces along the Palisadoes of the Counterscarp towards the Rayelin, and this night the Work will be farther advanced; and be fides, we shall endeavour to pass by the right point of the Horn-work, over the covered way, to the Ditch of the same, and to lodge there, to see; if under favor thereof, we can bring the Miners to the faid point of the Hornwork, seeing in the laid Ditch, the Earth is not high enough above the Water to make the Galleries between; and according to the success of this, it will be resolved, whether we shall first attack the said Hornwork, or whether we shall pals by it, and afterwards attack it in the neck. In the mean time we are preparing to attack the Ravelin to merrow; and to morrow morning we shall begin to fire from the three Batte-ries we have raise upon and on the two sides of the Dauphins Bastion. According to the report of the Deserters, the Gover-nor has removed his Magazines to the Wycle side, being resolved to retire th ther, when he cannot longer defend the Town on

this fide.

Nimeguen, Aug. 19. We have news here that 6000 men of the Munifer and Lunenburgh Troops that were at Stade, arrived yesterday at Wesel, that they were to pass the Rhine there, and so continue their march to Maistriebs.

Hogue, Aug. 21. The confirmation we have from Germany,

of the Retreat of the French Atmy, under the command of the Duke of Luxemburgh, gives us ground to hope that i bilipiburgh will now be furrendeed very quickly. We hope the fame of Machricht, though that Siege proves a work of great difficulty, and that the French are preparing, as they give out, to relieve it. The last Letters we had from the Princes Quarter, are lieve it. This morning the Mareschal de tregge caused all the Cavalry that has been encamped hereabouts, fince the beginning of this month, to march, in order to their joining the Mareschal de

Schomberg, who was yesterday at Senesser.

Tournay, Aug. 21. The Mareschal d'Humières is returned to Lise, his Troops, which were employed in the Siege of fre, and the taking the Fort of Linke being about toodo men, belides the Garifons that were left in those two places, having joined the Mareschal de Schomb.rg, who, as our Letters tel. us, was to encamp yesterday at Challerey : He will have a very confiderable Army, and we are here in expectation to hear very fuddenly of lome great Action. For it is faid that he will en-deavor to rail the Siege of Maiftricht, as we may believe that the Enemy will not omit any thing on their part to prevent it, so that it must come to a Battel. The Duke de Villa H rms fa was, according to our last Advices, marching with great dillegence, to join Count Wa leek on the other side of Bruffels.

Pin, Mil 2 In ut last, we told you of a Report that was spied at out Town, that Philipshogh was taken by the Imperialifts, which is fince contradicted, our last Letters from Alface giving us an account, That the place still makes a brave defence, and may do so for some time longer, the Governor being resolved to kallie out till the last. The Duke of Luremburgh, as these Letters informed us, was encamped about Weiffenburgh, from whence he intended to remove, for the conveniency of Forage, which they ther very much wanted. In Flanders hear, Mareichal et mberg is drawing together what Force he can, in order to the relief of Maestricht; and we are assured that he will have an Army of 35000 men From Sicily they write of a Conspiracy that had been discovered there, and that several considerable Persons were concerned in it. The arrival of our fleet was daily expected at Miffina.
