Pisa, December 16.

HIS Royal Highness the Duke of Gloucester is so far recovered of his late Indisposition, as to be able to take the Air on Horseback; which he has done twice; And his Royal Highness proposes, in seven or eight Days, to go from hence by Sea to Naples, on Board His Britannick Majesty's Ship the Alarm, now at Leghorn.

Vienna, December 18. Last Sunday, the 15th Instant, Prince Khevenhuller Metsch, Grand Master of the Household of their Imperial Majesties, signified, by their Order, before Divine Service, to the Ministers, Privy Councillors, and Chamberlains assembled in the Council Chamber, that their Majesties, in Consideration of the Merit and great Qualities of Count Charles Frederick de Hatzfeld and Gleichen, Knight of the Golden Fleece, Grand Croix of the Order of St. Stephen, formerly Great Chancellor of Bohemia and First Chancellor of Austria, and Minister of the Finances, had thought proper to appoint him Minister of State for Domestic Affairs, in the same Manner as was formerly Prince Stahremberg, at present Minister Plenipotentiary at Brussels; and to divide the Presidencies which he held; and, in Consideration of their Services, to appoint Count Henry Cajetan de Blumegen, Grand Croix of the Order of St. Stephen, to be Great Chancellor of Bohemia and First Chancellor of Austria, and Count Leopold de Kollowrath, Commander of the said Order of St. Stephen, and hitherto Chancellor of Bohemia and Austria, to be President of the Chamber of Finances, of the Ministerial Deputation of the Bank, and of the Council of Commerce.

Their Majesties, giving the like Attention to the Zeal and Talents exerted by Count Anthony de Pergen, in his Post of Minister of State for Foreign Affairs, have been pleased to preserve to him the Title and Prerogatives of the Place of Minister of State, in appointing him, at the same Time, Joint-Marshal of the Lower Austria, with Prince de Trautsohn, under the Title of Lands-Verweser.

Their Majesties were also pleased, the same Day, to name Count de Wurmb Vice-President of the Chamber of Finances, of the Ministerial Deputation of the Bank, and of the Council of Commerce; Baron de Reichach Vice-President of Commerce; Baron de Binder, Baron de Crofel, and M. de Loehr, to be Members of the Council of State.

Stockholm, December 24. The Diet adjourned last

Wednesday till the 7th of next Month. The King went to Eckholmsund last Friday, the Queen Yesterday, and the Princes this Morning.

Dresden, December 29. On Monday last, the Elector's Birth-day, (when his Electoral Highness entered into the 22d Year of his Age) was celebrated here with great Demonstrations of Joy, and the usual Ceremonies on that Occasion. In the Morning his Electoral Highness at his Levée received the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and the Nobility: In the Evening there was a Drawing-Room, at which the whole Court appeared in Gala.

Custom-House, London, January 3, 1772.

Whereas by an Act made in the 14th Year of the Reign of King Charles the Second, for preventing Frauds, and regulating Abuses in His Majesty's Customs, it is enacted,

That if any Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes shall be shipped or put on board, to be carried forth to the open Sea, from any one Port, Creek, or Member in this Kingdom, to be landed at any other Place of this Realm, without a Sufferance or Warrant first had and obtained from the Officers of His Majesty's Customs, all such Wares and Merchandizes shall be forfeited and lost; and that the Master of every Ship or Vessel that shall lade or take in any such Goods, Wares, or Merchandizes, shall, before the Vessel be removed or carried out of the Lading-Port, take out a Cocquet or Cocquets, and become bound to His Majesty, with good Security, in the Value of the Goods, for the Delivery thereof in the Port or Place for which the same shall be entered, or in some other Port or Place within Great Britain, and to return a Certificate thereof in Six Months from the Date of such Cocquet or Cocquets, to the Officers to whom such Security hath been given.

And, by another Act passed in the 11th Year of His present Majesty's Reign, to continue the Prohibition of the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal, Flour, Bread, Biscuit, and Starch, it is by the 4th Section enacted, that the said Act shall not extend to prohibit any Person or Persons to ship or put on board any of the Commodities aforesaid, to be carried Coastwise from any Port, Creek, or Member of Great Brit. in to any other Port, Creek, or Member of the same respectively, having such like Coast Cocquet or Sufferance for that Purpose, and such or like Security being first given for the landing and discharging the same in some other Port, Member, or Creek of the said Kingdom, and returning a Certificate in
