To all the Gentelmen of this tound You may inshore your houses and stocks but your lives cannot inshore we beter die by the eadg of the ford then to be starved on Friday the 20 of March in the morning you gave orders to fall the Bread and in the hafternoun to rife and we have five hundred men all of one minde and before this day month we shall have five thousen and we burn evry house down to the grown it dont fignify your feting a wath for we burn it before your faces if not a great alterations in all forts of provions we have as to

to men an hundred to command us as welthy men is any in gang of rogs so no more at present yours Mistres and Mister fiber slober
