Stockholm, March 10.

**L**AST Wednesday the Grand Deputation waited in a Body on the King with the Act of Assurances, which his Majesty was pleased to sign immediately.

The Expedition of this Affair has occasioned a Suspension of the Plena for some Time, so that the Orders did not meet again before last Saturday, when a Question came on before the House of Nobles, Whether the Secret Committee should be ordered to give, within the Term of three Weeks, their Report concerning the Complaints made against Mr. Jennings, as being partly the Cause of the present bad Situation of the Finances; or whether, according to the Proposition of the Order of Peasants, a separate Committee, or what is commonly called here a Commission, should be appointed to examine this Affair: Upon a Division it was carried, by a Majority of 272 Votes, to refer it to the Secret Committee.

The same Day the three other Orders resolved, that a Curator, and a Prosecutor for the Crown, should be appointed to enquire into the Bankruptcy of Mr. Finlay.

Yesterday Sir John Goodricke had a private Audience of their Swedish Majesties, to notify the Death of her Royal Highness the Princess Dowager of Wales; on which Occasion this Court will go into Mourning To-morrow.

Stockholm, March 17. Last Friday the Senators Hiarne, Stockenstrom, and Snoilsky, gave in their Petitions to the Senate, desiring Leave to resign their Places; which Petitions were referred to the Secret Committee, but are not yet come from thence to the Plena.

The States have not been assembled in Pleno during the whole of last Week; but it is supposed there will be one To-morrow.

General Rudbeck, the new Grand Governor of Stockholm, has taken Possession of his Employment with the usual Ceremony; and the Burghers gave him a grand Entertainment last Week on that Occasion.
