St. James's, August 19.

This Day Monsieur Jacob Benider was presented to His Majesty by the Lord of the Bed-Chamber in Waiting, as Minister from the Emperor of Morocco.

Florence, August 15: Yesterday Morning her Royal Highness the Great Dutchess was brought to Bed, at the Palace near the Town, of a Prince, who was a few Hours afterwards Christened by the Name of Alexander Leopold; Prince Charles of Lorraine was Godfather, being represented by Count Thurn. This happy Event was made known to the Publick by the Discharge of 100 Cannons from the Fortresses between Four and Five o'Clock in the Morning.

Copenhagen, August 18. By Advices from Helmsingbourg in Sweden we are informed, that the Garrison of Christianstadt had revolted a few Days before; that they had prevailed on the Inhabitants of that Town to join them; and that they had renounced all Obedience to the different Orders of the State. Prince Charles, the King of Sweden's Brother, is in Scania, where he has assembled and put himself at the Head of 4000 Men, with which he is marched towards Christianstadt.

Hague, August 25. Yesterday Morning her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange was safely delivered of a Prince.

Brussels, August 25. We have had in this Country the most plentiful Harvest that has been known for these several Years. The Wheat, Rye, and most Part of the Oats, are already got in, so that we may expect some Diminution of the Prices of Grain in general, which has been augmenting for these seven Years past.

Warwick, August 24, 1772.

The Deputy Lieutenants of the County of Warwick (in the Absence of the Lord Lieutenant of the said County) at a General Meeting held this Day at Warwick, for putting the Militia Laws in Execution, have ordered, that the Militia of the said County shall be trained and exercised this Year by Regiment, for Twenty-eight Days together; and that the said Militia shall assemble and meet at Warwick for that Purpose, on Saturday the 12th Day of September next; and all the Militia-Men of the said County are required to attend at the Time and Place of Exercise appointed as aforesaid: And if any Militia-Man (not labouring under any Infirmity incapacitating him) shall not appear at the Time and Place aforesaid, every such Militia-Man being convicted thereof will forfeit the Sum of Twenty Pounds; and if not immediately paid, the Justice of the Peace before whom such Militia-Man shall be so convicted is empowered to commit such Militia-Man to the Common Gaol of the said County, there to remain without Bail or Mainprize, for the Space of Six Months, or until he shall have paid the said Penalty.
