The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board the humble Petition of the Governor, Consuls, and Court of Assistants of the Russia Company, praying, for the Reasons therein contained, that the Quarantine now subsisting upon all Ships coming from the Russian Dominions may be taken off.—And whereas there was likewise read at the Board several Letters from His Majesty's Consul at Peterburgh, representing, that not only in that City, but by Advices from all other Parts of the Empire, they continue entirely free from the late Epidemical Distemper, notwithstanding the heat of the Season; and that there is not the least Symptom of the Plague to be found from Tassy in Moldavia to Peterburgh, every Town and City within the Boundaries of the Russian Empire being in good Health.—His Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Restraints upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine at present subsisting, by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 8th of July last, be taken off, so far as respects Ships and Vessels coming from Archangel, Peterburgh, Narva, Riga, or from any other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia; and that all Ships and Vessels already arrived, or that may hereafter arrive, from those Places, be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, provided that they have no Cotton-Wool on Board; that they bring with them clean Bills of Health; and that the Master, or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Custom-house Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that the Crews are free from all Infection.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Stockholm, August 28. Last Wednesday all the four Orders assembled in Pleno at the usual Places, for the first Time since the Revolution. The Marshal

of the Diet opened the Plenum of the Nobility with a long Panegyric upon the King, and congratulated the House of Nobles on Tranquillity's being restored. After which the new Form of Government was read there as well as in all the other Orders.

The Propositions which his Majesty made to the States Yesterday in the Hall of the States were also read, and are as follow:

“ Whereas the Affairs of the Government are by Divine Providence brought into such a Situation; as to admit of the speedy Conclusion of the Diet; but, nevertheless, as the States neither will nor can separate before they have given that Assistance to the King and Kingdom which the Government requires in every Branch of it, his Majesty has found it necessary to lay the following Points before the States for their Deliberations: “ 1st, That the usual Contributions may be agreed to and resolved by the States.

“ 2d, That, according to ancient Custom and the Laws of the Kingdom, an extraordinary Supply may be furnished for the Expences of the late King's Funeral, and for the Coronation.

“ 3d, As his Majesty cannot know how far these two Articles above-mentioned, together with the ordinary Revenues of the State, will be sufficient to answer the Necessities of the Kingdoms in these Times, his Majesty graciously invites the States, according to the 47th Section of the Form of Government, to chuse certain Persons of the three Orders who direct the Affairs of the Bank, with whom his Majesty may deliberate upon the Means to be used in certain Cases, and in which some Secrecy is necessary.

“ 4thly, That the States, by the Measures they take with regard to the Bank, put it in a Condition, the sooner the better, to assist in restoring Money Affairs to some Order, in a Manner consistent with the Laws.

“ The States will agree with his Majesty, that the Situation of the Kingdom requires, and that the Wishes of the whole Country are, that this Diet, which has now lasted Fourteen Months, to the great Expence of the Kingdom, may speedily come to an End: And as the King is highly desirous, in these difficult Times, to ease his faithful Subjects at least in this Respect, it is his Majesty's Pleasure, That the States take these Points into Consideration immediately, in order that he may receive their Report upon them within Fourteen Days, within which Time they will also find Opportunities to draw up the final Resolution of the Diet.”

In consequence of these his Majesty's Propositions, the four Orders resolved, that the Deputation of Revenues and Expences, and that of the Bank, shall immediately make the Project of the Contributions mentioned in the first and second Points,

Points, and give their Report about the third and fourth.

It was also proposed in the House of Nobles, and agreed to by the other Orders, that all the four Orders should wait on his Majesty with a Deputation of One Hundred and Twenty Persons, to return Thanks for his Majesty's paternal Care, by which the Nation has been restored to it's true Liberty, and to desire that a Medal may be struck in Commemoration of this happy Event.

The King having appointed Count Horn to be one of the new Senators, he took his Place in the Senate Yesterday.

Berlin, September 5. Her Royal Highness the Princess of Prussia was brought to Bed on Monday last the 31st of August, of a Princess; and a Courier was immediately dispatched to notify this Event to his Prussian Majesty in Silesia. Her Royal Highness and the young Princess both continue as well as can be expected.

On Sunday the 30th, Baron de Heiden arrived in six Days from the Hague, with the News of the Princess of Orange being happily delivered of a Prince. The same Day the Court appeared in Gala at Schoenhaußen, to congratulate her Majesty and the Princess Dowager of Prussia on this happy Event.

His Prussian Majesty was expected at Sans Souci Yesterday from his Reviews in Silesia. The Manœuvres at Potsdam begin the End of this Month.

And that the said threatening Letter was sent to th Secretary of the Bank, out of Resentment for his having published an Advertisement offering a Reward for apprehending Henry Williams, who stands charged on a violent Suspicion of having feloniously uttered and published a Bank Note for Ten Pounds, as true, knowing the same to be false, forged, and counterfeited: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in so atrocious a Crime, and so daring an Attempt to intimidate, and thereby prevent the legal Prosecution of Persons guilty of an Offence of so dangerous Consequence to the Publick, and so detrimental to the Credit of the Bank of

England, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter) who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicled thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, and in order to deter any Person from molesting or intimidating the Officers and Persons employed in endeavouring to bring to Justice the Person or Persons who have attempted, in open Violation of the Law, to commit Frauds on the Bank, to the Endangering of Publick Credit, the Governor and Company of the Bank of England do hereby promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED GUINEAS to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted) to be paid by the said Secretary of the Bank, upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.

Letters having been received from Rear-Admiral Montagu, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships in North America, and from the Governor of the Colony of Rhode Island, containing Advices, that, on the 10th of June last, a Number of Boats filled with armed Men, attacked His Majesty's Schooner the Gajpee, commanded by Lieutenant Dudingston, then lying in Narragansett River within the said Colony of Rhode Island; and that, after dangerously wounding the Commander of the said Schooner, they had plundered, burnt, and destroyed her: His Majesty has thereupon thought fit, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Great Britain, to constitute and appoint Joseph Wanton, Daniel Horsmanden, Frederick Smyth, Peter Oliver, and Robert Auchmuty, Esquires, to be His Majesty's Commissioners for inquiring into all the Circumstances relative to the attacking, taking, plundering, and burning, the said Schooner, and to the Insults offered or Obstructions given, on this Occasion, to His Majesty's Officers within the said Colony of Rhode Island. And in order to the discovering and bringing to Justice the Offenders in that daring Insult and Attack upon His Majesty's Authority and Commission, His Majesty has been farther pleased to order a Proclamation to be passed under the Great Seal of Great Britain, and to be printed and published within the said Colony of Rhode Island, offering His Majesty's gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders, (excepting the Persons who wounded Lieutenant Dudingston, and excepting Two others who assumed to be the Sheriff of the Colony, and the Captain or Leader of the Insurgents) who shall discover any of their Accomplices, and also offering Rewards for such Discovery.
