AT the Court at St. James's, the 10th Day of September, 1772.

P R E S E N T,
The KING's most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board the humble Petition of the Governor, Consuls, and Court of Assistants of the Russia Company, praying, for the Reasons therein contained, that the Quarantine now subsisting upon all Ships coming from the Russian Dominions may be taken off.—And whereas there was likewise read at the Board several Letters from His Majesty's Consul at Peterburgh, representing, that not only in that City, but by Advices from all other Parts of the Empire, they continue entirely free from the late Epidemical Distemper, notwithstanding the Heat of the Season; and that there is not the least Symptom of the Plague to be found from Jassy in Moldavia to Peterburgh, every Town and City within the Boundaries of the Russian Empire being in good Health.—His Majesty taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Restraints upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine at present subsisting, by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 8th of July last, be taken off, so far as respects Ships and Vessels coming from Archangel, Peterburgh, Narva, Riga, or from any other Port or Place in the Dominions of Russia; and that all Ships and Vessels already arrived, or that may hereafter arrive, from those Places, be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings, without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing any Quarantine, provided that they have no Cotton-wool on Board; that they bring with them clean Bills of Health; and that the Master, or other Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel, do first make Oath before the Custom-house Officer or Chief Magistrate, on their Arrival at the Place where they are bound to, that the Crews are free from all Infection.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

Florence, August 25. By the Accounts received here of the Wheat Harvest, it appears, that in Piedmont, the Territories of Genoa, Mantua, Ferrara, Venice, and all Lombardy, it has been so deficient, that they will stand in Need of very large Supplies. In the Pope's Territory, and the Two Sicilies, the Harvest has been rather favourable, so that they will be able to spare some Corn; but hitherto the Exportation of it has been strictly prohibited, especially from the Ecclesiastical State. The Quantity, which will be wanted here, is at least Two Hundred Thousand Quarters English Measure, even if the Crop of Chestnuts in the mountainous Part of Tuscany should prove plentiful, which however is at present quite uncertain, as they are not gathered till November, and are subject to Accidents till within a short Time before the Gathering.
