HE Report of the Plague having broken out in this City is entirely void of Foundation, this City, and all other Parts of Sicily, being entirely free from any Kind of epidemical Diftemper. The Report is supposed to have taken rise from a French Ship from Tunis putting into this Harbour some Weeks ago, having sprung so dangerous a Leak at Sea that she sunk a few Minutes after her Arrival, the Crew having been previously landed at the Lazaretto, where they are now performing Quaranitne.

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Dresden, November 18. On Monday Morning died, at Dresden, Prince Lubomirski, in the 78th Year of his Age. He had the Rank of General in the Saxon Service, and commanded the Regiment of Grenadier Foot Guards. He was a Native of Poland, and the Head of a very illustrious Family in that Country. He has left a very considerable Fortune in Germany and Poland, to be divided between his three Daughters.

Berlin, Navember 21. Her Royal Highness the Princess Ferdinand was happily delivered, on Wednesday the 18th Instant, of a Prince, at Frederickfeldt, a Country Palace about Four Miles from hence, and on Friday Seventy-two Pieces of Canon were fired here on that Occasion.
