

present is; in the mean time his Ministers and Officers in the Duchy of *Fuliers*, and the County of *Bergs*, are endeavouring to raise a considerable Sum of money, to make preparations for the marriage of the young Princess of *Newbourg*, who it's said, will in few days be declared Empress. The Inhabitants of this Diocess suffer extremely by the incursions of the *French* of *Maeſtricht*, who oblige them to pay double Contributions. From *Limburg* on the *Laba* of the 5th instant they write, that the *Lunenburgh* Troops advanced still towards the *Rhine*, but that they took but slow marches, by reason of the bad weather, and that the Duke of *Zell* was expected in person with his said Troops, Yesterday the *Munster* Troops arrived near *Alaenkirchen* and *Hackenbourg*, they, as well as the *Lunenburgh*, march directly towards *Coblenz*, where they will pass the *Rhine*. From *Mariendal* they write, that the Electoral Prince of *Saxony* arrived the 29 past with 1400 Horse near that place, being on his march towards the Imperial Army.

Charleville, *8th*. 6. The *Mareschal de Crequi* having, it's said, had advice that the *Spaniards* had an intention to possess the *Archduchy of Bayillon*, which belongs to the Elector of *Cologne*, to prevent them marched thither with a Body of men he had drawn together, and summoned the Governor to receive a *French* Garrison, which he refused; but the *Mareschal* setting down before the place to Besiege it, the Governor the Baron *Berlo* surrendered it the 30 past. The 3d instant the *Mareschal* marched towards *Virton* in the Country of *Luxemburg*, where he will quarter his Troops, and expect an account of the march of the *Lunenburgh* and *Munster* Troops, who march so slowly, that we are not in any pain for what they will enterprize this Campaign; and even if they should enter upon any action, the *Mareschal de Crequi* will have a sufficient Army to oppose them; the *Mareschal de Schomberg* is gone towards *Mabouze*, his Troops are quartered between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse* to refresh them. We hear not any thing of the Enemy, who remains very still.

Brussels, *8th*. 9. The *Confederate* Army continues encamped near *Tillemont*, though it's expected the Troops will now in few days separate, and go into Winter quarters; some Regiments have already left the Army; on Wednesday last 2 Regiments of Spanish Horse marched to *Ghent*, and the day following two Regiments more with six Companies of Dragoons, marched towards *St Omer*, where they are to winter. The Duke of *Oranburg* is returned from *Antwerp* to the Army, where, it's said, he received a considerable Sum of money. Yesterday arrived the Ordinary from *Spain*, the most considerable News it brought, was the Declaration of the King of *Spain's* Marriage with the Emperors daughter. From *Liege* of the 7th instant they write, that the *French* have demolished *Marche en Famine* and *Bastogne*, to open a free passage between *Limburg* and *Sedan*: That the Baron *Berlo*, Governor of the Castle of *Bouillon*, was come to *Liege*, having, as it's said, justified himself, as to the surrendering of that place, the whole Garrison having absolutely refused to discharge a Musket against the *French*. The *Mareschal Schomberg* is about *Binche* and *Mabouze* with the *French* Army, which will go speedily into Winter-quarters, according to the report of some Prisoners that have been lately taken.

Paris, *8th*. 10. The 6th instant, the *Sieur Contarini*, who is lately arrived here in quality of Ambassador Extraordinary from the Republick of *Venice*, had his first publick Audience of his Majesty at *Versailles*, to which he was conducted by the *Mareschal de Loge*, and the Introducer of Ambassadors: And yesterday the *Popes* Nuncio had likewise Audience of his Majesty, to acquaint him with the elevation of Cardinal *Desfals-*

chi to the *Papacy*. The 5th instant was Christned at *St Con* the young Duke of *Chartres*, and *Madamoiselle de Chartres*, in the presence of their Majesties, and several persons of the greatest quality; the Prince of *Conde* was Godfather, and the great Dutchess of *Tuscany* Godmother to the Duke of *Chartres*, who was named *Philippe*; and the Duke of *Enghien* was Godfather, and *Madam de Guise* Godmother to *Madamoiselle de Chartres*, who was named *Elizabeth Charlotte*. We are told of a fresh Supply that is to be sent from *Thionon* to *Messina*, from whence we are expecting to hear of some considerable enterprize. Our Letters from *Alsace* give us an account, that on the 5th instant the Imperial Army, under the command of the Duke of *Lorraine*, was near *Kinsflut*, about *Basse*, and that his Highness had designed to have passed through the Territory of the Bishop of *Basse*, but that the *Swiss* Canions had prayed him that he would not, to whose instance he had in part yielded, and perhaps the rather, for that some *French* Troops had been detached to assist the *Swissers*, to oppose his passage: And that the 6th instant, the Duke of *Luxemburg* repassed the *Rhine* with his Army, which was no longer able to subsist on the other side. From *Flanders*, and those parts they write, That our Troops having taken *Bouillon*, they are fortifying it, as likewise *Arlon* near *Luxemburg*, to prevent the incursions of the *Enemy*. *Rochefort* and *Marle en Famine* they have demolished. The Forces commanded by the *Mareschal de Schomberg*, are in quarters of refreshment between the *Sambre* and the *Meuse*, from whence it's thought they will remove about the latter end of this month into Winter-quarters. According to our last advices, the *Mareschal de Crequi* was near *Cirque* on the *Moselle*, with 16 or 17000 men, composed of several detachments as well from the Army in *Flanders*, as that in *Alsace*, to make head against the *Lunenburgh* and *Munster* Troops who march on that side, though very slowly.

Whitehall, *8th*. 4. This morning early His Majesty, accompanied by his Royal Highness, parted hence for *Newmarket*, where His Majesty purposes to pass some short time.
