

East-India House, February 23, 1774.

THE Court of Directors of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East-Indies, in Pursuance of the Authority vested in them by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for establishing certain Regulations for the better Management of the Affairs of the East-India Company, as well in India as in Europe," to appoint the Manner and Order for the Choice of Directors of the said Company, at the ensuing General Election of Directors, according to the Directions of the said Act, do, in Consequence of an unanimous Resolution of the said Court, hereby give Notice,

That at the General Court to be held on the 13th Day of April next, for the Election of Directors, pursuant to the said Act, the Six Candidates duly qualified, who shall on the Scrutiny appear to have the greatest Number of Votes, shall be and be declared to be Six Directors of the said Company chosen for Four Years.

That the Six Candidates duly qualified, who shall on the said Scrutiny appear to have the next highest Number of Votes, shall be and be declared to be Six Directors of the said Company chosen for Three Years.

That the Six Candidates duly qualified, who shall on the said Scrutiny appear to have the next highest Number of Votes, shall be and be declared to be Six Directors of the said Company chosen for Two Years.

And that the Six Candidates duly qualified, who shall on the said Scrutiny appear to have the next highest Number of Votes, shall be and be declared to be Six Directors of the said Company chosen for One Year.

And the said Court of Directors do hereby further give Notice,

That if any List given in at the said Election shall contain more than Twenty-four or less than Twenty-two Persons qualified to be Directors, then such List, and all the Names therein, will be totally rejected.

That in Case of an Equality of Votes between any two or more Candidates at the said Election, then the same is to be reported by the Scrutinizers to the General Court, that the Choice may be determined in the said Court by Lot, conformably to the Directions in the Company's Charter, for that Purpose.
