

St. James's, May 14, 1774.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that on the 28th of April last, between the Hours of One and Three in the Morning, the Dwelling-House of Mrs. Williamson, in Garratt-Lane, Wandsworth, in the County of Surry, was broken open, and robbed of sundry Things of Value, to the Amount of near Three Hundred Pounds, by three Men, whilst a fourth stood on the Outside of the said House: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Robbery, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

HIS late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th Day of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Offi-
