

Referring to ourselves, not to extend this to the Dutch and Hamburg Contractors, if Circumstances should appear to us to require it.

Lastly, with respect to manufactured Goods, regard shall be had to their different Kinds, as well as to the Difference which there may be between our Provinces.

Hard Wares, Wrought Pewter, and Lead, as also Linnen Cloth, and Table Linnen, manufactured in England, may be imported into our Dominions without Distinction, and shall pay no other Taxes than those paid by our own Trading Subjects, according to the different Tariffs established with them. But as to Woollen, Cotton or Silk, Stuffs, as also Leather Wares, Metal Wares, and Lace, they may be imported into our Provinces of East and West Prussia, in the Quantity which is permitted to the Merchants of our said Provinces.

But with respect to our Provinces on the Oder and Elbe, they shall remain under the Regulations of former Ordinances, particularly that of the 20th of March 1734, issued by Order of the late King our Father.

Nevertheless in all our Provinces of Westphalia above-mentioned, to wit, the Dutchies of Cleves and Gueldres, the Principalities of Minden, East Friesland and Meurs, the Counties of Mark, Ravensberg, Tecklenbourg and Lingen, the Importation of all these manufactured Merchandizes, as in general of all other English Merchandizes, shall be permitted without demanding for them the least Excise, and without any Thing being paid for them, except what the Towns have a Right to demand for their Publick Chests. Finally, we declare, that whereas we are informed that the Officers of our Customs in our Sea-Ports, particularly in Prussia and at Stettin, in Return for the Treatment which our Ships receive in consequence of the Act of Navigation, seem to think that those of the English ought to be treated more rigorously than those of other Nations, we entirely disapprove of this, but on the contrary will and ordain, that, excepting the usual Duty of the Port or Harbour, none whatever shall be demanded from, or imposed on, English Ships; but that they shall be treated as the most friendly of all Commercial Nations.

Such is our Pleasure; and for the greater Surety we will that this our Edict be printed and published every where: We will and ordain, that all our Officers Military and Civil, of what Condition soever, and particularly the Departments of our Military, and Finances, the General Administration of our Customs and Excise, all our Colleges of Justice, and all our Subjects without any Exception whatever, conform themselves hereto, and take Care that This be duly executed. Given at Berlin this 11th of May, 1774.

Turin, June 3. We have most violent Storms here every Day, and the Hail and heavy Rains have done considerable Damage in many Parts of this Country. The Silk Worms have suffered very much.

Hamburg, June 10. We learn from Wismar, that the Squadron, destined to convoy the Princess of Holstein Gottorp to Sweden, arrived at that Port on the 1st Instant.

This Squadron, commanded by Admiral Wrangel, consists of one Ship of the Line of 70 Guns, two Frigates of 40 Guns each, one Yacht, and a Transport Vessel for the Baggage. The Persons on board the Squadron are; the Countess Ferlen; the Countess Ulrica Taube, Grand Governess; Mademoiselle Caroline Lowenhaupt, Lady of the Bedchamber; Mademoiselle Magdalena Lowenhaupt and Eleonora Eckebladt, Maids of Honour; one Marshal of the Court; two Chamberlains, Baron Klinckeström and Count Rüper; one Master of the Horse, Baron Relamp; Count Possé, Gentleman of the Court; with a grand Retinue of Servants; but the future Princess of Sudermania, we hear, will not set out for Wismar before the Return of the Courier, who is dispatched to Stockholm on Account of Baron Hopken (President of the Tribunal of Wismar) being unable, through Illness, to perform the Office of Proxy at the ensuing Marriage.

Berlin, June 11. His Prussian Majesty went last Wednesday to Schoenhaußen, to pass the Summer Season; and the same Day his Royal Highness Prince Henry set out for Rhinsberg, with the like Intention.

Mentz, June 11. About Five o'Clock this Evening died here his Serene Highness the Elector of Mentz, having been afflicted for some Time past with a Dropsy in his Breast.

Ostend, June 11. The contagious Distemper among the Black Cattle has entirely ceased in our Neighbourhood.
