Stockholm, June 14.
LAST Week his Swedish Majesty signified to the Senate his Intention of visiting the Empress of Russia: His Majesty proposes to begin his Journey in the Beginning of next Month, and to be at Petersburg on the 1st of August.

Paris, June 22. On Saturday Morning his most Christian Majesty, the two Princes his Brothers, and the Countess d'Artois, were inoculated. The Operation was performed by M. Richard in the Presence of M. Joubertout an eminent Surgeon.

THE Commissioners for managing His Majesty's Stamp Duties, in pursuance of a Clause in an Act passed this present Session of Parliament, intitled, "An Act to indemnify such Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments, &c." do give this timely Notice, That by the said Act it is enacted, for the Relief of any Person or Persons who through Neglect or Inadvertency have omitted to pay the several Rates and Duties, or any Part thereof, upon Monies, given, paid, contracted, or agreed for, with relation to any Clerks, Apprentices, or Servants, and to have the Articles and Agreements stamped within the Times limited by former Acts of Parliament, or who have omitted to insert and write in Words at Length, in such Indentures or Writings, the full Sum or Sums of Money, or any Part thereof received, or in any wise directly or indirectly given, paid, or agreed, or contracted for with every such Clerk, Apprentice, or Servant, That upon Payment of the said Rates and Duties upon Monies, or such Part of such Monies so neglected or omitted to be paid, on or before the first Day of September, 1774, and tendering the said Indentures or Writings, to be stamped at the same Time, or at any Time on or before the Twenty-ninth Day of September, 1774, the same shall be good and available in Law and Equity, and may be given in Evidence in any Court whatsoever; and the Clerks, Apprentices, or Servants, shall be capable of following and exercising their respective intended Trade or Employment, as fully as if the said Rates and Duties so omitted had been duly paid, and the full Sum received or agreed for had been inserted; and the Persons who have incurred any Penalties by the said Omissions, are by the said Act acquitted and discharged from the said Penalties, except such Persons against whom any Process has been already commenced.
