Leopol, Odob. 30. Hofe that come trom the Kings Camp, fpeak with admitation of what they have feen t ere, they tell us, That he King had not with thim above 15000 men, to oppofe an Army of 200000, who had befet his Camp on all

fides, and made their Approaches to it in the fame manner as they would have done to a place befieges; That the Turks had advanced very confiderably, and had r ifed a Bartery ne r the Pollin Camp of that height that the Poles lav altogether open to their Cannon, and beflues, begun to be in very great want of Provisions when the Peace was conclued, and redeem d them a moft from an inevitable ruine, after which the Turks and Tar ars immediately decamped and retired, leaving to the wonder of all people two great pieces of e annon, wi havery great quantity of Ammunition behins them in their Camp, which we I ppose they die by way of oftentarion to fhew the abundance they had, or elfe through want of Carriag s. We expect his Maj.ity here in two or three days, and a triumphil Arch is preparing here, which he is to pais when he enters this Lily.

• Vicana, Nov. 15. His Imperial Majelly will certainly part hence the 23 inftant, on his ay to Lintz, where he purpoles to arrive the 28.b, and on the 5th of Detemb at Paffaw; the 12th his Imperial Majelty will make a vifit to his Bride, at a place cilled Newburg, not far from Paffaw, where the marriage will be celebrated the next day. Here is arrived within thefe about 17 perfons; he has not yet had any Audience, but we are told that his bufinels is to affure this Court of the con tant refolution of the Grand Signior to maintain the perce and good correspondence which is at prefer.

Copenhagen, Nov. 17. In Schonen che A mies fiand in the fame posture I advised in my last, and what was faid of the two Kings having had a Conference together proves a mistake, occasioned by the meeting of two purties, with which both Kings were for it h ppened that their Majesties were abroad at the fame tine, each with a Body of Horse, to discover the posture of his Enemies; they parted not without fome skirmish, in which the Danes' pretend to have had the advantage, and thut of the Suedes fide fiveral Persons of Quality were killed, and others taken Prisoners. We are likewife told that upon the Suedes retreat from Helfingburg the Governor of the Castle fallied out upon them, and killed and took Prisoners about 300 of them.

Ditto, Nov. 24. Our laft advices from Schonen tell us, that the 18 inftant at night the Suedifh Army decemped, and marched with great fpeed, putting their Infantry behind their Cavalry, and in Waggons, with intention to have got between the Daaifh Army and Matmoe in order to the selievin, it, but that the King of Denmath having timely notice of the Enemies defign prevented it, marching with his Army nearer to Matmoe, and encamping within half a League of the

place, where he continues, not being above a League from he Enemits Camp. We are told that h Danes begin to be very impatient of the cold an igors of the feafon, and therefore are defirou to come to a decifive action, which, it's believed, edes will avoid, for that they can better endure h fhips, and int not omike a Wint r War. Yefterday ived here he D nifh Men of War that had been before Gottenburg, and in them the Sieur Guidenlicht Viceroy of No way who immediately paffed over into Schonen, to attend the King. The Duke of Holffein Ploen is I kiwife an wed here in his re un to the Army.

Ham urg Nov. 27 On Monday last the Duke of Zell artived 3 Z 11, the place of his ordinary refidence, On Monday last the Duke of having Litt his a roops ready to go into their W inter-quarters. Id Pomerca the Campagne is likewife at an end, and the Elector of Brandenburg is retuined to The Imperial Tr ops which have ferved as Berlin. Auxiliaries to the laid Elector this ummer are marching towa.ds Silefia, and, it's faid, that they are to be employed in Hungary, wi ere the Rebels giow very confi-derable. We had five al reports liere concerning a Conference between the two Kings in chonen, and an En a zmeut afterwards between the two Armie , but the last Letter from Copenhagen which are of the 24 inflant contradict them, and only fay, that the Armies had changed their quarters, and that the King of Denmark was encamped about a League from Malmoe, upon a vice that the Suedes had a defign to make a farther attempt to relieve that place, and that in order thereunto, the whole Suedish Army was to march that way. The faid Swedish Army when these Letters came away lay half a League from Landfersone, being about a League front the Danes, who, it's faid, defire to come to an action, which may determine the Campagne, rather than be obliged to continue in the Field in this Scafon.
