Westminster, November 30. IS Majesty came this Day to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, feated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Sir Francis Molyneux, Knt. Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to make the following most Gracious Speech.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

T gives Me much Concern, that I am obliged,
at the Opening of this Parliament, to inform you, That a most daring Spirit of Relisance and Disobedience to the Law still unhappily prevails in the Province of the Massachuset's Bay, and has, in divers Parts of it, broke forth in fresh Violences of a very criminal Nature. These Proceedings have been countenanced and encouraged in other of My Colonies, and unwarrantable Attempts have been made to obstruct the Commerce of this Kingdom, by unlawful Combinations. I have taken fuch Measures, and given such Orders, as I judged men proper and essecual for carrying into Execution the Laws which were passed in the last Schion of the late Parliament, for the Protection and Security of the Commerce of My Subjects, and for the Reflering and Preserving Peace, Order, and good Government, in the Province of the Masachafee's Bay; and you may depend upon My firm and fiedfall I efolution to withfiand every Attempt to weaker or impair the supreme Authority of this Logification over all the Dominions of My Crown; the Malificulties of which I confider as effectial to the Digity the Santy, and the Wolfare, of the British English, asking Myfelf, that, while I act upon the principles, I shall never fail to receive you Assauce and Support.

I have the greatest Satisfaction in being able to inform you. That a Treaty of Peace is concluded between Ruffle and the Porte. By this happy Event, the Trouble, watch have fo long prevailed in one Part of Europe are composed, and the general Tranquillity renewal a complete. It shall be My constant Aim and Enc. 14.0018 to prevent the Breaking out of fresh Disturb. aces; and I cannot but statter Myself I shall succeed, as I continue to receive the being equally as soled to preferve the Peace.

Gentlemen , ti soule of Commons,

I have ordered the proper Estimates for the Service of the enforce year to be laid before you; and I doubt not but that, in this House of Commons, I shall meet with the fame affectionate Confidence, and the same Proofs of Zeal and Attachment to my Person and Government, which I have always, during the Course of My Reign, received from My faithful Commons.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

Let Me particularly recommend to you, at this Time, to proceed with Temper in your Deliberations, and with Unanimity in your Resolutions. Let my People, in crery Part of my Dominions, be taught by your Example, to have a due Per erence for the Laws, and a just Sense of the Bissings, of Our excellent Constitution. They may be actured that on My Part. I have nothing to much as Heart that, on My Part, I have nothing so much at Heart as the real Prosperity and lasting Happiness of all My Subjects.
