An Act for taking down the Church of All Saints, in the Town of Fulbourne and County of Cambridge; and for the better repairing and keeping in Repair the Church of St. Vigors in the said Town.

An Act for the more easy and speedy Recovery of Small Debts within the Hundred of Elloe in the County of Lincoln.

An Act for extending the Duty of Two Pennies Scots, or One Sixth Part of a Penny Sterling, payable on every Pint of Ale and Beer vendred or sold in the Village of Port Glasgow, and the Privileges thereof, over the Town of Newark; for supplying the Inhabitants of Port Glasgow and Newark with fresh Water; for paving, cleaning, lighting, and watching, the Streets of the said two Towns; for erecting public Markets therein; for repairing and keeping in Repair the Breast and East and West Quays of the Harbour of Port Glasgow; and other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act to enable the Inhabitants of the Parish of St. Paul Covent Garden in the County of Middelsex, to purchase or hire a convenient Piece of Ground, for the Purpose of erecting a Workhouse thereon, for the Reception and Employment of the Poor of the said Parish; and for providing an additional Burial Ground for the Use of the said Parish.

An Act for continuing and making more effectual several Acts of Parliament, for repairing the Roads from Luton in the County of Bedford, to Westwood Gate in the said County, and from Luton to St. Albans in the County of Hertford.

An Act to continue the Term of an Act made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing and widening the several Roads in the County of Peebles, leading from Tweedscrofs, towards the City of Edinburgh, by Blythe Bridge, La Mancha, and Whem, and by Linton and Carlots, and from Ingleston, through Carlots, until all the said Roads join the Limits of the County of Edinburgh.

An Act to enlarge the Term of several Acts, passed in the Sixth Year of the Reign of Queen Anne, the Eleventh Year of the Reign of King George the First, and the Tenth, Thirteenth, and Thirty-first Years of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, for repairing the Highways from Old Stratford, in the County of Northampton, to Dunchurch, in the County of Warwick, and for more effectually amending the said Highways.

An Act to enlarge the Term and Powers of several Acts, for repairing the Road from Beaconsfield, in the County of Bucks, to Stokenchurch, in the County of Oxford.

The King has been pleased to present the Reverend Thomas Bellas, Clerk, to the Rectory of Holdenby in the County of Northampton and Diocese of Peterborough, void by the Death of the Reverend James Ansell, the last Incumbent.

Copenhagen, May 13. A Placart, which was published here on the 9th Instant, diminishing the Value of the small Danish current Specie by one Third,

has occasioned very great Discontent; and this Morning, upon a Report that another Placart was to come out, ordering the Bank Notes of one Rix-dollar (the only Currency here) to brought into the Bank, and exchanged within the Course of the Day, on pain of being declared of no Value, the whole Town ran to the Bank, all the Avenues to the Palace were filled, and the Tumult became so great, that Mischief was apprehended. The Guards were put under Arms, and the Officers of the Police appeared, who with much Difficulty dispersed the Multitude after reading a Proclamation, by which a Reward is offered for apprehending the Authors of the Riot.

THE Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty being informed, that, notwithstanding His Majesty's Pleasure signified to His Consuls residing in Foreign Parts, several Masters of Ships and Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, which have come into the Ports where they the said Consuls reside, have upon their Demand refused to produce to them the Passes which they have received, in order to their endorsing the same in the Manner they are required to do: Their Lordships do therefore give Notice, that it is expected all such Masters of Ships or Vessels coming into any Port where there is any such Consul, do, at their Peril, strictly comply with His Majesty's Pleasure, by producing to them the Passes in their Possession; and that when any Ship or Vessel belonging to His Majesty's Subjects shall be sold at any Port abroad, where a British Minister or Consul doth reside, their Masters do deliver to such Minister or Consul their Pass; or, if no such Minister or Consul, transmit them, as soon as possibly they can, to this Office, in order to their being cancelled, that they may not, to the Prejudice of the Trade of His Majesty's Subjects, fall into the Hands of Foreigners; otherwise their Bonds will be put in Suit with the utmost Severity of the Law. And their Lordships do hereby give Notice to all Masters of Ships or Vessels belonging to His Majesty's Subjects, who may receive Passes either from this Office, or from any of the Governors of His Majesty's Foreign Islands or Plantations, that, by an Act passed in the Fourth Year of His late Majesty, it is made Felony, without Benefit of the Clergy, if any Erasure or Alteration what ever shall be found made in such Passes.

HIS late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th Day of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims, may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Mr. Bilson, at the Admiralty-Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of Sea-Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, as well as to the Widows of those who died since that Time, whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, such Monies as may be due to them on the 31st of May instant; This is to give Notice, that any Widows who have not yet applied, and intend to lay in their Claims, may do so as soon as possible; and that all such Widows, whose Claims have been already allowed, may send or bring to this Office, as soon as possible, the Affidavits required by the Rules, in order to their being continued upon the Pension or Bounty.
