gence and Encouragement, which Justice to the Reft of your Majelly's People, and the common Intereft, Safety, and Welfare of the Empire will admit of ; yet we cannot but condemn that uncandid and 'malignant Spirit, not but condemn that uncandid and 'malignant Spirit, with which they have boldly imputed to the Britifh Le-giflature odious and iniquitous Defigns againft the juft Rights and Liberties of your Majefty's Subjects; with Intention to influme the Minds of your People here, and hurry them likewife into unnatural Acts of Violence; whilft we can perceive no Ground for fo black an Im-putation, but the Legiflature's endeavouring to protect the Perfons and Properties of peaceable Subjects from the Perfons and Properties of peaceable Subjects from Injury, to fupport Order and Government, and to main-tain its own Conflictuional Authority. We cannot but condemn that Want of Equity which leads them to urge the Advantages Great Britain derives from their Commerce as a fufficient Reason for their not being subjected to hear an equitable Proportion in the public Burdens of the State, whilft, from the fame Commerce, them-felves derive fuperior Advantages, according to their Property employed in it, and their different Ranks and Conditions in Life. We cannot but condemn their Want of Gratitude to their Parent Country, and of Tendernefs to their poorer Fellow-Subjects here, fhewn in the rafh, unwarrantable Prohibition of all Commerce with your Majefty's European Dominions; by which they defigned and hoped to deprive those of the Means of Subfiltence, who, by the Sweat of their Brows, had long contributed to the Protection and Prosperity of America; though, we have the Pleasure to affure your Majesty, we as yet feel no fuel melancholy Effects of American Ingratitude and Unkindness, by any unusual Failure of Demand for our Manufactures, or of Em-

Failure of Demand for our Manufactures, or of Employment for our Poor. Ardently withing for the fpeedy Reftoration of Peace and Harmony throughout the British Empire, upon an equitable and Constitutional Foundation; we at the fame Time think it our Duty to affure your Majefty of our determined Readiness to use any lawful Means in our Power, to fupport the Constitutional Rights of your Crown and of the British Parliament in and over every Part of the British Dominions; not doubting but that, from the Purity of your Majefty's Intentions, and the Benevolence of your Heart, all definable Mercy will be mixed with any Severity that will with deep Regret be feen needful for accomplifting that important End.

That your Majefty may long reign with Glory and Honour over a free, a united, a happy and grateful People; that your Defeendants, adorned with Princely Virtues, and Friends to the Rights and Happinefs of Mankind, may inherit your Crown to lateft Ages, is the fervent Prayer of your Majefty's dutiful and faithful Subjects,

To the KING's most Excellent Majesty.

Moft Gracious Sovereign,

E, your Majofty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs, Burgefles, and Inhabitants of the Town of Southampton, humbly approach your Throne, expressing our Acknowledgements of the many Bleffings we enjoy under your Majesty's aufpicious Reign.

Reign. Zealous for the Honour of our Sovereign, the Profperity of our Country, and the Support of the Laws of this Kingdom, we ardently with your Majefty may very long rule in the Hearts of all your People, where-ever difperfed through your extensive Dominions, and cannot but lament that our Fellow-Subjects in America, for-getful of the Succour and Pretection fo conftantly af-forded them by this their Denest Start forded them by this their Parent State, have fuffered themfelves to be deluded by the Arts of wicked and licentious Men, and proceeded to Acts of Rebellion against your Royal Person and Government. In Teitimony therefore of our Abhorrence of those pernicious Maxims, by which they pretend to justify their Conduct, we prefume to intreat your Majefty to use the most ef-fectual Means to affert your Royal Authority, vindicate the injured Supremacy of the British Legislature, and recal the infatuated Colonists to their Allegiance. And because we fear the milder Influence of Reason and Perfuafion will still be found inadequate to those truly defirable Ends, while those unhappy Men continue wil-fully ignorant of your Majelty's gracious Intentions towards them, and blind to the pleasing Prospect of Accommodation, we beg Leave to allure your Majefty that we will, at the Hazard of all that is valuable to us, fupport the Dignity of your Crown, and exert all our Power to preferve the utmost Limits of your Empire undiminished, and in due Obedience to your Majesty and

your illustrious Family. May the God of Wifdom and of Power direct your Majefty's Councils for the Reftoration of Harmory and Peace, or go forth with your Fleets and Armies in the Profecution of your undoubted Rights over every Part of the Dominions which He, by whom Kings reign, has committed to your Care.
