The following Address of the Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council of Forres, has been presented to His Majesty by Henry Dundas, Esq; Lord Advocate of Scotland, being introduced by the Lord of His Majesty's Bed-Chamber in Waiting: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

DEEMPLY impressed with a just and grateful Sense of the many invaluable Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and beneficent Reign, the Provost, Magistrates, and Town-Council of Forres, humbly beg Leave to approach the Throne, to declare their firm Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Administration.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we will, with the greatest Cheerfulness, to the utmost of our Power, support the Dignity of your Crown, and the Honour of Great-Britain, in reducing the rebellious Colonies in North America to a Sense of the Duty they owe to your Majesty and the Parent State.

Though we abhor the turbulent and seditious Spirit that actuates the refractory Colonies, and applaud the spirited coercive Measures that are now adopted by Administration to reduce them to a proper Allegiance to their King, and Dependance on the Mother Country; instigated by the Feelings of Humanity, we commiserate the Fate of our unhappy deluded Fellow-Subjects, who, excited by a malevolent domestic Faction, have heedlessly plunged themselves into all the Horrors of a most unnatural Civil War; and rejoice to think, that when they return to their Duty, they will be again received under the Protection of the best Government that ever Human Wisdom framed, and into the Favour of a Prince, whose Glory it is to be in every Respect a constitutional and patriotic King.

We felicitate your Majesty and ourselves on having the Prospect of a national and well-regulated Militia in North Britain, which we are convinced will answer every good Purpose Government can expect.

That your Majesty may be speedily enabled to restore Peace to your Colonies, and diffuse Happiness over all the British Empire, is the fervent Prayer of,

The King has been pleased to grant unto Marlowe Sidney Crow, of the City of London, Merchant, and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname of Marlowe, instead of that of Crow, and bear the Arms of Marlowe, (such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office;) and also to order, that this Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in the College of Arms.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That in the Morning of the 22d of February last, it was discovered, that an Attempt had been made the preceding Night, by Persons unknown, to break into a Cellar in the Port of Dover, in which were deposited Goods belonging to the Crown, by breaking a large Hole in the Wall under the outward Door; but there being two other strong Doors, they were prevented from getting into the Cellar, though they had endeavoured to effect it by an Instrument, which is judged to be an Iron Crow; and that in the same Night they also attempted another Cellar, made Use of for the like Purpose, and endeavoured to force off the Iron Bar of the outward Door, which was secured by two Locks, one of which they forced, and broke the other, but could not get it off: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Offence, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his, her, or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
