At Noon there was a very numerous Assembly of the Nobility and other

Persons of Distinction, of both Sexes, at the Castle, who appeared in great Splendor to compliment His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode set to Musick was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency to the Ladies; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy throughout this City.

WHereas, about Five o'Clock in the Afternoon of Saturday the 7th of December last, a dreadful Fire broke out in the Rope-house of His Majesty's Yard at Portsmouth, which raged with such Violence, that before the same could be extinguished the greatest Part of the said Rope-house was burnt down, and the Stores and Materials therein were totally consumed and destroyed: And whereas there is great Reason to suspect that the said Rope-house, Stores, and Materials, were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some evil-disposed Persons at present unknown: In order therefore to discover and bring to Justice the Persons guilty of the above mentioned Offence, My Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty are pleased to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS, unto or amongst such Person or Persons as shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offence, so as such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by the Treasurer of His Majesty's Navy, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a farther Encouragement, any of the said Offenders (except the Person who actually set the Premises on Fire) who shall discover any one or more of his or their Accomplices in the said Offence, so as he or they shall be apprehended and prosecuted to Conviction, will be intitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

WHereas there is strong Reason to suspect that the Rope-House in the Dock-Yard at Portsmouth was, on the 7th of December last, most wickedly and mali-



diouſly ſet on Fire; and whereas ſeveral Attempts (ſome of which have taken Effect) have been made to ſet Fire to the City of Briſtol; and as there is Reaſon to ſuppoſe that the Incendiary or Incendiaries may have been the ſame in both Caſes, the following Deſcription of a Perſon who was ſeen in the Rope-Houſe in Portſmouth-Yard on the Day the ſaid Fire happened, and whoſe Conduct was ſuſpicious, is now publiſhed, in Hopes that, on his Apprehenſion, ſome Light may be thrown on theſe two dreadful Tranſactions:

He was called John, and is a Painter; ſaid he worked as ſuch with one Golding at Titchfield in Hampſhire. He appeared to be about 25 or 26 Years of Age, is about Five Feet Seven Inches high, his Complexion fair, with a ſmooth Face, and whitish Eyelids; ſaid to have a ſort of Stammering in his Speech; had his own Hair, of a light ſandy Colour, neither tied up or curled; thinniſh in Body, and thin faced; he had on a Surtout Coat, Chocolate-coloured, but faded; his Hat ſmartly cocked, with a Fan-tailed Flap.

Whoever will apprehend the ſaid John the Painter, and bring him before any Magiſtrate, or give ſuch Notice as may be the Means of his being apprehended, ſo that he be produced to His Maſteſty's Commiſſioner of Portſmouth Dock-Yard, or to the Commiſſioners of His Maſteſty's Navy in London, ſhall receive FIFTY POUNDS Reward, to be paid by the Commiſſioners of the Navy: Or if the ſaid Perſon, knowing himſelf to be innocent, and will voluntarily appear before Commiſſioner Gambier at Portſmouth, or the Commiſſioners of His Maſteſty's Navy in London, he ſhall himſelf be entitled to the ſame Reward.

James Morgan and Sons, was attempted to be burnt, the ſaid Warehouse having been broken open, and a Box therein, containing ſeveral Combuſtible Materials, ſet on Fire; and alſo that, on Sunday Morning laſt the 19th Inſtant, about Seven o'Clock, a dreadful Fire broke out in a Range of Warehouſes in a Place called Quay-Lane in the ſaid City of Briſtol, whereby the whole Range of Warehouſes, with the ſeveral Dwelling-Houſes adjoining and oppoſite to the ſaid Warehouſes, were immediately in Flames; and whereas there is the greateſt Reaſon to ſuſpect, that the ſaid Ships and Warehouſes were wilfully and maliciously ſet on Fire by ſome evil-diſpoſed Perſons at preſent unknown: His Maſteſty, for the better diſcovering and bringing to Juſtice the Perſons concerned in the above-mentioned atrocious Offences, or either of them, is hereby pleaſed to promiſe His moſt gracious Pardon to any one of the ſaid Offenders, (except the Perſon or Perſons who actually ſet Fire to the ſaid Ships or Warehouſes) who ſhall diſcover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the ſaid Offences, or either of them, ſo that he, ſhe, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, His Maſteſty is hereby alſo pleaſed to promiſe a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS unto, or amongſt, ſuch Perſon or Perſons (except as before excepted) who ſhall, within Three Months from this Time, diſcover any of the Offenders guilty of the ſaid Offences, or either of them, ſo that ſuch Offenders, or any one or more of them, ſhall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the ſaid Reward to be paid, clear of all Deductions whatſoever, by the Right Honourable the Lords Commiſſioners of His Maſteſty's Treasury, immediately after the Conviction of ſuch Offender or Offenders.
