THIS Day Alleyne Fitzherbert, Esq; had the Honour to kiss the King's Hand on being appointed His Majesty's Resident at the Court of Bruffels.

The King has been pleased to grant unto George Arnold Sargent, Esq; (eldest Son and Heir apparent of John Sargent, of Halsted Place in the County of Kent, Esq;) and to his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname and bear the Arms of Arnold only, (such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office) and also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

The King has been pleased to grant unto John Williams, of Kennet Hall in the County of Cambridge Esq; and to his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to take the Name of Onslow in Addition to that of Williams, and to bear the Arms of Onslow quarterly with those of Williams, (such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office;) and also to order, that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

The King has been pleased to present and appoint the Reverend James Playfair to the Church and Parish of Meigle in the Presbytery of Meigle and County of Perth in Scotland, now vacant by the Death of the Reverend Alexander Scott.

WHETHERAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the 25th Day of October last, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders, as should be

employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Eighth Day of November last, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid, in the Manner thereby directed; to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged by Order in Council to the Twenty-eighth Day of this Instant February; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer: His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore Order; and it is hereby accordingly ordered; That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said Twenty-eighth Day of this Instant February to the Thirtieth Day of April next inclusive.—Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

WHETHERAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 20th Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this instant February: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September last, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders; His Majesty doth therefore; by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whomsoever (except the

Master-General, Lieutenant General, or Principal Officers, of the Ordnance; for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant February, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September last, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition."— And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

And, as a further Encouragement for bringing to Punishment the Person or Persons who committed the atrocious Crime of setting the said Ships on Fire, the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Bristol do hereby promise a Reward of ONE HUNDRED GUINEAS, to be paid without any Deduction whatsoever by the Chamberlain of the said City to any Person or Persons

James Morgan and Sons, was attempted to be burnt, the said Warehouse having been broken open, and a Box therein, containing several Combustible Materials, set on Fire; and also that, on Sunday Morning last, the 19th Instant, about Seven o'Clock, a dreadful Fire broke out in a Range of Warehouses in a Place called Quay-Lane in the said City of Bristol, whereby the whole Range of Warehouses, with the several Dwelling-Houses adjoining and opposite to the said Warehouses, were immediately in Flames; and whereat there is the greatest Reason to suspect, that the said Ships and Warehouses were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some evil-disposed Persons at present unknown: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the abovementioned atrocious Offences, or either of them, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders, (except the Person or Persons who actually set Fire to the said Ships or Warehouses) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Offences, or either of them, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, His Majesty is hereby also pleased to promise a Reward of ONE THOUSAND POUNDS unto, or amongst, such Person or Persons (except as before excepted) who shall, within Three Months from this Time, discover any of the Offenders guilty of the said Offences, or either of them, so that such Offenders, or any one or more of them, shall be apprehended and duly convicted thereof; the said Reward to be paid, clear of all Deductions whatsoever, by the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, immediately after the Conviction of such Offender or Offenders.

And, as a farther Encouragement, any of the said Offenders (except the Person who actually set the Premises on Fire) who shall discover any one or more of his or their Accomplices in the said Offence, so as he or they shall be apprehended and prosecuted to Conviction, will be intitled to His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
