The Infide of the Gallery is about 304 English Feet long, and about 33 English Feet wide.

The Queen, the King, and the rest of the Royal Family came to their Apartments early in the Forenoon.

Soon after Four o'Clock, the Procession began from the Royal Apartments, through the several Chambers; where the Ladies of Quality and the Foreign Ministers were placed: The Windows of these several Chambers look into the Gallery.

The Order of the Procession was as follows:

Heralds and other Officers. The Tribunals. Servants of the Palace. Sons of the Grandees. Some of the principal Clergy. The Conde de Sas Laurenzo, Royal Standard Bearer. The Prince of Brafil. The Infant Dom Joan his Brother, carrying the Sword of State, as Lord High Conflible, pro bac vice.
The QUEEN.

Her Majesty was supported by Senhor Dom Joao de Bem Posta, Môr Domo Môr, Lord Steward of her Majesty's Houshold.

The Queen's Train was borne by the Camareira Môr, First Lady of her Bedchamber. The other Ladies of the Palace followed.

The King, in a Royal Mantle, his Train borne, walked on the Queen's Left Hand, wearing his Hat.

The Procession passed through the Apartments and along the Gallery; (Musick playing in the Gallery) at the upper End of which were placed, under a Canopy, Two State Chairs of the same Form and Size. The Queen having seated herfels in one of these Chairs, the King state the other, under the same Canopy, on her Majesty's Left Hand.

The Prince of Brafil, and his Brother the Infant Dom Joao were placed on her Majesty's Right Hand.

Proclamation for Silence being made, a Speech was pronounced by an Ecclesiastick of the Tribunal of the Dezembargo do Paço.

Her Majesty then took the usual Oath, which was read to her by the Visconde de Villa Nova de Cerveira, Secretary of State for the Affairs of the Kingdom.

During the Administring the Oath to Her Ma-jesty, the King stood up, uncovered.

No Oath was tendered to the King. The Prince of Brazil, and the Infant Dom Joao his Brother, did Homage, and took the Oaths to Her Majesty: And the Grandees, Nobility, Clergy, and others, and the feveral Tribunals, did the same; and, after kissing Her Majesty's Hand, they had the Honour to kiss the King's Hand.

After which the Royal Standard Bearer stepped forward in the Gallery, and caused Proclamation to be made of Her Majesty's Accession to the Throne; and then went to the Side of the Gallery which looks into the Square, and caused Proclamation to be made in the same Manner to the People, (many Thousands being affembled) which was answered by the People with Viva, and other Demonstrations of

Joy.
The Ships in the River, and the Castles and

Fortresles, faluting at the same Time.

The Queen then returned with the same Solemnity, (the Musick playing) holding her Scepter in her Lest Hand (her Right Hand being supported by Senhor Dom Joao de Bem Posta) thewing herself frequently to the People: And when her Majesty came to a Balcony, which projected from the Center of the Gallery, she advanced, and remained there some Time; the People faluting her Majesty on this, and on the other Occasions of her appearing, with repeated Acclamations of Viva.

Her Majesty then proceeded through the Aparoments to the Chapel, where Te Deum was sung.

This Ceremony terminated at Night with Grand Illuminations and Rejoicings throughout the City.
The Queen Mother was in a Box incognita.

The Princesses were present in another Box. Several Titles were given, and other Granco-made, in Favour of the Nobility.
