St. James's, September 30, 1777.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That a most daring Robbery of Bank Notes, Money, &c. was committed last Friday Morning in the Apartments of Baron de Kutzleben, Minister Resident from his Serene Highness the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel, in the House of Mr. M'Culloch, Apothecary, in Bolton-Street, Piccadilly; and that the Perpetrators of the said Robbery, not content with stealing the said Property, set Fire to a Trunk containing the said Property, as well as a Quantity of Papers of great Consequence, which put the whole House in imminent Danger: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this horrid Transaction, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually committed the Fact) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, the said Baron de Kutzleben doth hereby promise a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS, to any Person making such Discovery as aforesaid, (except as before excepted) to be paid upon the Conviction of any one or more of the Offenders.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That on Tuesday Evening last a most horrid Murder was committed on the Body of Isaac Layton, then being an Assistant to William Spence, one of the Officers

of the Customs, in the Execution of his Duty in seizing and securing a large Quantity of Tea from a Gang of Smugglers, assembled near Wimbledon Common in the County of Surry; one of which said Smugglers was wounded by a Cutlass in his Right Arm: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Murder, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the Offenders, who shall discover any Two or more of his Accomplices, so that they may be apprehended and convicted thereof,—except the Person who gave the Wounds which were the Cause of said Layton's Death.
