The King's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the 25th of October 1776, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy. And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the 8th Day of November, 1776, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen, who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the said 31st Day of December. And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the 15th Day of August last, to promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should voluntarily enter himself to serve on Board any of His Majesty's Ships, on or before the 31st Day of October then next, should receive as of His Majesty's Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, to be paid in Manner thereby directed. And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged and extended to the 31st Day of this Instant December; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His

Privy-Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 31st Day of this Instant December, to the 28th Day of February, 1778, inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

St. James's, December 9, 1777.

*W*HEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That *William Yeal, James McClellan, William Rumford, and Martin Shepherd, Officers of the Customs at Hartlepool in the Port of Stockton, having, about Eleven o'Clock in the Night of the 14th of last Month, seized on the Sea Coast near that Port, from Three Men belonging to a Smuggling Vessel, Twenty-five Bags of Tea and Three Bags of Coffee Berries, which they conveyed to the Custom House at Hartlepool aforesaid, and there continued guarding the same till about Twelve o'Clock at Night, when it was surrounded by Fifteen or Sixteen Men belonging to the said Smuggling Vessel, armed with Blunderbusses, Pistols, and other offensive Weapons, several of which they discharged through the Windows and Door of the said Custom-house, and afterwards feloniously broke and entered the same, when the Officers were obliged, for the Preservation of their Lives, to retreat into the Warehouses above Stairs; that they afterwards fired through the Ceiling into the Warehouse where the Officers had retired to, and thereby put their Lives in the utmost Hazard; that they then broke open the Warehouse Door, presented a Blunderbuss to the Breast of the said James McClellan, and threatened to destroy him and the rest of the Officers, if they made the least Resistance; and by Force and Violence refused and carried away the said Tea and Coffee, so seized by the said Officers, and lodged for safe Custody in the said Custom-house:*

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in breaking open the said Custom-house, and rescuing and carrying away the said Goods, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders, who shall discover his Accomplishes, so that Two or more of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And, as a farther Encouragement, the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs do hereby promise a Reward of FIFTY POUNDS, to the Person discovering and apprehending the said Offenders, to be paid by the Receiver-General of His Majesty's Customs, upon Conviction.

past, illicit Practices have been made Use of by several Persons
here, in making up base and bad Watches, and putting thereon
the Names of the most respectable and known London Watch-
makers, to the great Prejudice and Discredit of the said
Watchmakers, and contrary to an Act of Parliament, and
Bye Laws of the said Company: Therefore, that no Person or
Persons may hereafter plead Ignorance of the said Act and
Bye-Law, the said Company have hereby caused the said Act
and Bye-Law to be published, with Notice, that if any Per-
son or Persons shall hereafter be found offending therein, that
the said Act and Bye-Law will be put in Force against such
Offender or Offenders by the said Company.

“ITEM, Whereas there hath formerly been divers and
sundry and great Abuses offered to divers expert and sufficient
Workmen in the said Art or Trade of Clockmaking, as well
by importing from beyond the Seas as by making within the
Realm: faulty and deceitful Work, upon which have been set
the Names or Marks of some other Workman who made it
not, to the Discredit and Disgrace of them the said wronged
Workmen, whereby the others Dishonesty and Deceit is not
discovered: It is therefore ordained, that whosoever hereafter
shall be found, by the Master, Wardens and Assistants of the
Fellowship of Clockmakers, or by any of them, or their
lawful Deputy or Deputies, to have imported such Work
from beyond the Seas, falsely marked, to sell or exchange by
Way of Merchandizing, or to have set any Man's Name or
Mark upon any Work made within this Kingdom or Dominion
of Wales, other than the Name or Mark of the true Maker or
Finisher thereof, shall forfeit the said Work or Works to the
King's Majesty, His Heirs and Successors; and also be fined
to the Use of the said Master, Wardens and Fellowship of
Clockmakers, for every Time so offending, and for every

Piece of Work which he or they shall be found to offend in
the Sum of Forty Shillings, or other greater or less Sum accord-
ing to the Nature and Quality of the said Offence, to be taxed
by the Master, Wardens and Court of Assistants of the said
Company.

“And whereas great Quantities of empty Boxes, Cases, and
Dial-plates for Clocks and Watches, have been exported with-
out their Movements, and in Foreign Parts made up with bad
Movements, and thereon some London Watchmakers Names
engraven, and so are sold Abroad for English Work; and also
there have been the like ill Practices in England by divers Per-
sons, as well by some professing the Art of Clock and Watch-
making as others ignorant therein, in putting counterfeit
Names, as also the Names of the most known London Watch-
makers, on their bad Clocks and Watches, to the great Pre-
judice of the Buyers, and the Disreputation of the said Art at
Home and Abroad: For the preventing, therefore, of all such
ill Practices for the Future, be it enacted by the Authority
aforesaid, That no Person or Persons whatsoever shall, after
the said Four and Twentieth Day of June, export or send out
of this Kingdom of England, Dominion of Wales, or Town of
Berwick upon Tweed, any outward or inward Box, Case, or
Dial-plate, of Gold, Silver, Brass, or other Metal for Clock
or Watch, without the Movement, in or with every such Box,
Case, or Dial plate, made up fit for Use, with the Clock or
Watchmaker's Name engraven thereon. Nor any Person what-
soever, after the said Four and Twentieth Day of June, shall
make up or cause to be made up any Clock or Watch, with-
out engraving or putting, or causing to be engraven or put, his
or her own Name and Place of Abode, or Freedom, and no
other Name or Place, on every Clock or Watch he or she shall
so make up, or cause to be made up, under the Penalty of
forfeiting every such empty Box, Case, and Dial-plate, Clock
and Watch, not made up and engraven as aforesaid; and also
for each and every such Offence the Sum of Twenty Pounds,
one Moiety whereof to be to His Majesty, His Heirs and Suc-
cessors, and the other Moiety shall be to him, her, or them,
that shall sue for the same in any of His Majesty's Courts of
Record, by an Action of Debt, Bill, Plaint or Information,
wherein no Essoin, Protection, or Wager of Law, shall be al-
lowed, or more than one Imparance; any Thing therein con-
tained, or any Law or Statute to the contrary thereof in any-
wise notwithstanding.

A Summons by an Edict.

JOHNS George Wiefner, the elder Son of George Wolfgang
Wiefner, a Manufacturer of Stockings of this Place, born in
the Year 1737, and after he had been brought up to the
Business of a Merchant went from his native Place, in the
Year 1753, to New York in America, a City at present very
well known, and officiated at Divine Service in the chief
Church there, but is said to be dead, with both his Wife and
Children; for, during the Space of Eighteen Years, we have
heard nothing certain of him. And whereas his Father, who
is still living, has a Mind of making his last Will for the Be-
nefit of his Children, and has for this Reason prayed that the
Council of Justice, which our most Serene Prince the Margrave

tain it is that he and his Children, if they do not appear, will
be locked upon as deceased; and, for this very Reason, all the
Estates of George Wolfgang Wiefner will be bequeathed to his
Children living in this City. Moreover therewith, all those
who have a certain Knowledge of the Life, Death, or other
Fate of the said Wiefner thus summoned, are required kindly
to give Notice of what they know to the College of News from
which these Summons are made Public.
