affure your Majefty of our fleady Attachment to your Royal Perion and Government; and that we will, to the utmost Extent of our Power, with our Lives and Fortunes, support every Measure that will tend to maintain the Rights of the Conflitu-tion, to fecure the Dignity of your Crown, and to disappoint the Designs, and punish the Perfidy of your Enemies.

Our peaceable Demeanour and thorough Acquiescence to the Laws of this Kingdom for near an entire Century, though we are by them (as the Unbiassed and Benevolent humanely confider) excluded from the Privileges other Subjects enjoy, are irrefragable. Arguments, we conceive, and stronger Proofs of the Sincerity of our Protestations, than any verbal Declarations we can poffibly make.

We have the most grateful Senfe of the Huma-nity with which your Illustrious House has uniformly, fince its Acceffion to the Throne of Great Britain, gracioufly pleafed to regard the Roman Ca-tholics of this Kingdom in general.
