The following Address having been transmitted by his Excellency the Earl of Buckinghamshire, Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, to the Lord Viscount Weymouth, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has been presented to His Majesty: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, Address from the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, and Inhabitants of the County of Clare.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, and Inhabitants of the County of Clare, convened at our General Assizes, with all Humility beg Leave to approach your Royal Person, to declare our Sentiments at this alarming Period.

With the utmost Indignation we heard the Account of the inimical Conduct adopted by the Court of France, in concluding a Treaty with your Majesty's Subjects in America; in order to render abortive those ample Terms of Reconciliation which your Majesty's most gracious Disposition induced you to propose.

Whatever Consequences may result from this hostile Procedure, we, having the most perfect Reliance on your Majesty's Wisdom, are determined to support your Majesty's Measures in the most strenuous Manner, with our Lives and Fortunes, to the utmost of our Abilities.

Situated in this remote Part of your Kingdom, we can with Confidence assure your Majesty, that you have not more loyal Subjects than the Inhabitants of this County, among whom any Opposition to the due Execution of the Laws has been utterly unknown.

As we have hitherto enjoyed the Blessings of Peace and Security, the happy Fruits of your Majesty's Wisdom and paternal Regard; so, with Hearts replete with Love and Veneration, we entreat Permission to declare our steady Zeal and warmest Attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person and Government.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, That, between the Hours of Eleven and Twelve of the Clock on Friday Night the 26th of June last, the Playhouse, known by the Name of China Hall Theatre, at Rotherhithe, in the Lower Road to Deptford, was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown, and totally consumed: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in so atrocious a Crime, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who did actually set Fire to the said House) who shall discover his or her

Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

ON Saturday last the 4th Instant, about Eleven at Night, the Post-Boy was attacked and robbed, Eight Miles from York, in the Road to Malton, of the Bag of Letters from this Office of Thursday Night last the 2d Instant, for Scarborough, Malton, Whitby, and other Places within the Delivery of Scarborough and Malton, and also of the Bag with the Bye and Roan Letters for the same Places.

The Person who committed this Robbery was then on Foot, but when he passed two Turnpike Gates in the Neighbourhood was mounted upon a Light Bay mottled Horse, about Fourteen Hands and an Half high, strong made; and the Bar-keepers agree with the Post-Boy in the Description of the Robber, that he was a stout Man, Six Feet high, and thin in the Face, with Black Stockings, Waistcoat and Breeches, and Brown Copper-coloured Coat; his own short curled Hair powdered, with a round Hat, two Sides of it tied up; and the Post-Boy observed, whilst he lay with his Hands and Feet bound in a Field adjoining the Road, that the Robber put the Bills, &c. which he took out of the Letters, into the inside Pocket of his light Great Coat.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be intitled to a Reward of **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS**, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending High-waymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be intitled to the same Reward of **TWO HUNDRED POUNDS**, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
