L, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Grand Jury, and Inhabitants of the County of Clare, convened at our General Affizes, with all Humility beg Leave to approach your Royal Perfon, to declare our Sentiments at this alarming Period.

With the utmost Indignation we heard the Ac count of the inimical Conduct adopted by the Court of France, in concluding a Treaty with your Majesty's Subjects in America, in order to render abortive those ample Terms of Reconciliation which your Majefty's most gracious Disposition induced you to propose.

As we have hitherto enjoyed the Bleffings of Peace and Security, the happy Fruits of your Majesty's Wisdom and paternal Regard; so, with Hearts replete with Love and Veneration, we entreat Permiffion to declare our fleady Zeal and warmeft At-tachment to your Majesty's facred Perfon and Government.

ON Saturday last the 4th Instant, about Eleven at Night, the Post Boy was attacked and robbed, Eight Miles from York, in the Road to Malton, of the Bag of Letters from this Office of Thursday Night last the 2d Inflant, for Scarborough, Malton, Whitby, and other Places within the Delivery of Scarbsrough ana Malton, and allo of the Bag with the Bye and Roaa Letters for the fame Places.

The Person who committed this Robbery was then on Foot, but when he paffed two Turnpike Gates in. the Neighbourhood was mounted upon a Light Bay mettled Horfe, about Fourteen Hands and an Half bigb, firong made; and the Bur-keepers agree with the Post-Boy in the Defeription of the Robber, that he was a flout Man, Six Feet high, and thin in the Face, with Black Stockings, Waiftcoat and Ereeches, and Brown Copper-coloured Coat; bis own short curled Hair powdered, with a round Hat, two Sides of it tied up; and the Post-Boy observed, whilf he lay with his Hands and Feet bound in a Field adjuning the Road, that the Robber put the Bills, Sc. which he took out of the Letters, into the infiae Pocket of his light Great Coat.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Perjon who committed this Roubery, will be intitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending Highwaymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the ame may be apprehended and brought to Justice, fuch Difcoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be initiled to the fame Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majejly's most gracious Pardon.
