Ostend, April 24. We have advice that on the 21 inst *St. Omer* Capitulated, and the next day was Surrendered upon Honourable Conditions, the Garrison is to march to *Bruges*. The Prince of *Orange's* Army lies dispersed in the several Villages between *Bruges* and *Ghent*, in order to refresh themselves. till his Highness receives the Recruits he expects from several places, which begin already to arrive; his Highness has his Head-quarters at *Eckelo*, and we are told that in 8 or 10 dayes he will have a very brave Army together again, and then we may expect to hear of some farther Action in these parts. We have an account that the most Christian King was expected at *Dunkirk* as this day.

Paris, April 24. The King having put his Troops into Quarters of refreshment, is, as we understand, gone to visit his Maritime places, as *Dunkirk* and *Calais*, from whence his Majesty will return hither. We do not yet know the Conditions which the Duke of *Orleans* granted to the Town of *St Omer*, farther then that one is, that the Garrison should be conducted to *Ipres* or *Bruges*. Threecore Standards and Colours taken from the *Dutch* in the last Battel, have been brought hither, and are hung up in our Cathedral Church of *Notre-dame*. In the Relation that is printed here of that Fight it is said, that 4500 of the Enemy were slain, and 2000 taken Prisoners: We cannot yet learn the particulars of our loss. From *Lorraine* our Letters advise, that the Duke of *Lorraine* is marching with 15 or 16000 Imperialists towards the *Moselle*, to oppose whom the *Mareschal de Cequi* is drawing his Forces together.

Dover, April 15. This day arrived here a small Bark from *Calais*, the Master of which reports, That on *Friday*, about 6 in the afternoon, the King arrived there. That yesterday about noon, the Duke of *Orleans* came likewise thither from *St. Omer*; out of which the Spanish Garrison marched not till *Friday* morning, consisting in 3000 Foot, and 800 Horse, taking only with them six covered Wagons. That this morning early the King and the Duke of *Orleans* went for *Dunkirk*, and are expected back at *Calais* on *Wednesday* next, and from thence they intend for *Paris*.

Whitehall, April 16. His Majesty being come this evening into the House of Lords, in His Royal Robes, with the Crown upon His Head, and with the usual Solemnity seated in His Throne, was pleased to send for the House of Commons up; who accordingly attending His Majesty at the Bar of the Lords House, several Bills, as well Publick as Private, were presented to His Majesty, to which His Majesty was graciously pleased to give His Royal Assent. The Publick Acts are as follow,

1. An Act for Raising the sum of Five hundred eighty four thousand nine hundred seventy eight pounds two shillings and two pence half-penny, for the speedy Building Thirty Ships of War.
2. An Act for an Additional Excise upon Beer, Ale, and other Liguors, for Three Years.
3. An Act for the better Observation of the Lords Day, commonly called Sunday.
4. An Act for prevention of Frauds and Perjuries.
5. An Act for taking of Affidavits in the Country, to be made use of in the Courts of Kings-Bench, Common Pleas, and Exchequer.
6. An Act for Confirming and Perpetuating Augmentations made by Ecclesiastical Persons to small Vicarages and Curacies.
7. An Act for taking away the Writ de Hæretico comburendo.
8. An Act for the Naturalizing of Children of His Majesties English Subjects born in Foreign Countries during the late Troubles.
9. An Act for Erecting a Judicature to determine Differences touching Houses Burnt and Destroyed by the late dreadful Fire in Southwark.
10. An Act for the better Repairing and Maintaining the Peere of Great Yarmouth.

After which, the Lord Chancellor, by His Majesty's Command, acquainted the Two Houses, that His Majesty gave them leave to Adjourn till the 21 of May next: And accordingly the Two Houses Adjourned till that time.
