P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 25th Day of October 1776, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 8th Day of November, 1776, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the 31st Day of December, 1776: And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 15th Day of August 1777, to promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should voluntarily enter himself to serve on Board any of His Majesty's Ships, on or before the 31st Day of October then next, should receive, as of His Majesty's Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, to be paid in Manner thereby directed: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged and extended to the 28th Day of this instant February; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 28th Day of this instant February to the 30th Day of April next, inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the 18th Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exporting out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire on the 23d of this instant February: And

whereas it is judged expedient that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, except in those Cases where (for the Benefit and Advantage of Trade, and for the Use and Defence of Ships trading to Foreign Parts, and of the Transports and Victualling Vessels employed in His Majesty's Service) His Majesty, by His several Orders in Council of the 13th and 27th of October, and of the 6th and 22d of November, 1775, of the 5th and 19th of February, and the 23d of August and 25th of September, 1776, of the 16th of April, the 13th of August, and the 3d and 10th of October, 1777, of the 19th of June, the 7th and 26th of August, and the 10th of September last, has thought proper to permit and allow the Exportation of, and carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder, Saltpetre, Arms and Ammunition, under certain Conditions and Restrictions mentioned in the said Orders: His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whomsoever (except the Master-General, Lieutenant-General, or Principal Officers of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do, at any Time during the Space of Three Months, to commence from the said 23d Day of this instant February, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder, Saltpetre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, except in the Cases comprized within the aforementioned Orders in Council, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the 29th Year of His late Majesty's Reign, entitled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Saltpetre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Saltpetre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition." — And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for Executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

Copenhagen, February 6. A Placart was issued on Monday, last for enforcing the Execution of the Standing Regulations for the Lighthouses and Beacons throughout the Coasts of Denmark, Norway, &c. by ordering the Danish Subjects, and encouraging Foreigners, to give immediate and accurate Information of every Instance of Negligence that shall come under their Observation, in a Point of so much Importance to the Lives and Fortunes of Navigators; and all the Danish Beacons and Lighthouses, particularly those upon Anholt, are put into compleat Repair.

Minden, February 7. For some Days past almost the whole of the Army quartered in this Electorate has either been in Motion or preparing to move. Several Bodies are in March towards the Frontiers of Bohemia. A Corps under General Teuffel, of about 100 Volunteers, drawn from the Regiments near this Place, was to have passed the Forest of Eichwald on the other Side of Dippoldif walde the Night before last, and it appears their March is directed towards Toplitz; at the same Time General Mollendorff, with a Body of between 35 and 1600 Men, moved from Freyberg towards Seyda, on the Road to Commotau; and we since hear, that, after having penetrated into Bohemia, had met with some Resistance near Brix, in which he had his Horse killed under him, but his Loss was very inconsiderable; and when the last Messenger came away, the General had made above 100 Prisoners, and taken two Pieces of Cannon. The Saxon General Anhalt, with as numerous a Body, has also moved forward towards Adorf, in the Road to Egra.

When the last Accounts came away from Silesia, the Aultrians remained in Possession of Habelschwert and Zugmantel in the County of Glatz; and the King of Prussia had marched out of Schweidnitz with an Intention to dislodge them.

(Superscribed) For John Harward, Esq; at Plymtree near Culampton, Devon:

John Harward

Old Harward I will tell thee thou art an old Rogue and I am Sorry that I should lost my Labour the other Night, I was informed that thee received a Slight Wound but now I find to the Contrary therefore I would have thee take Care for the last Error will be worse than the first.

P. S. You old Turk you are no Cristian, nor Englishman, Butt you are a Land Mare Maid half fool and half Rogue, take heed and dont Deceive thy Neighbour nor thy self for you are Deceived by your nasty beeches of Whores this from your Friends

And also that, about the 3d or 4th Day of this present Month of February, a Letter was brought to the House of Francis Rose Drew, of Grainge in the Parish of Broadhembury in the said County of Devon, Esq; by the General Post, of which Letter the following is a Copy, viz.

(Superscribed) For Frances Rose Drew, Esq; at Broad Hembury-Grange, Devon:

London Jan. 1. 1779.

Drew thee art a Narrow Back, Lowfey, false, Little forswearing, Little Rogue I dont look upon thee no more than the Leaf of an Asp for he Whivers and is gone, and be ye no more in remembrance I would have thee remember the old Carey's Coach when he received a Brace of Balls I would have thee drop in thy Knees and give thanks to Powder for its Dampness I would have thee Live like a Gentleman not like a Land Mar Maid half fool and half Rogue as thou behaves thyself.

Which Letter appears to be written in the same Hand Writing as that to Mr. Harward.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in discharging the said Guns, or in writing or sending the said Letters, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person or Persons who did actually discharge the said Guns, or write the said Letters) who shall discover his or her Accomplices or Ac-

complices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
