Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, That, on Sunday last, the 18th Instant, between the Hours of One and Two in the Afternoon, a Fire broke out in the Stable of a Farm-house, called Earle's Hall, in the Parish of St. Osyth in the County of Essex, the Property of the Earl of Rochford, late in the Occupation of John Deane, and now in the Occupation of John Baker, whereby the said Stable and a Barn full of Corn were entirely consumed, together with Six Cart-horses; and whereas there is great Reason to believe that the said Stable was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire, by some evil-disposed Person or Persons unknown:
