P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for repealing an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for the more easy and better Recruiting of His Majesty's Land Forces and Marines; and for substituting other and more effectual Provisions in the Place thereof;" It is, among other Things, enacted, That it shall be lawful for His Majesty to suspend or revive the Execution of the said Act, with respect to the Whole of Great Britain, or any Part thereof, by Proclamation or Order in Council, or other publick Notice in the London Gazette: And whereas it hath been represented to His Majesty, that great Inconveniencies may arise from executing the said Act in the Country at large, during the Time of Hay and Corn Harvest; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, That from and after the Twenty-second Day of this Instant May, the further Execution of the said Act for repealing an Act made in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act for the more easy and better Recruiting of His Majesty's Land Forces and Marines, and for substituting other and more effectual Provisions in the Place thereof;" shall be suspended (until further Notice) throughout every County and Place in South Britain, except the Cities, Towns and Places undermentioned, where the same Inconveniencies are not likely to occur, and where the Act may continue to be executed with Benefit to His Majesty's Service, viz.

The City of London, the City and Liberties of Westminster, and such Part of the County of Middlesex, as lies within the Bills of Mortality.

The Borough of Southwark, and East Half Hundred of Brixton, consisting of the following Parishes, viz.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 25th Day of October 1776, to promise and declare, That the Bounties of Five Pounds for every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, fit for His Majesty's Service, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to every such Able and Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, who should, on or before the 31st of December then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or the Chief Officers on Board such Tenders as should be employed for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 8th Day of November, 1776, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Two Pounds for every Able, and Thirty Shillings for every Ordinary Seaman, should be paid in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might secrete themselves, that so such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's said Service, by any of His Majesty's Sea-Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the 31st Day of December, 1776: And whereas His Majesty was likewise pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the 15th Day of August 1777, to promise and declare, That every Able-bodied Landman, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should voluntarily enter himself to serve on Board any of His Majesty's Ships, on or before the 31st Day of October then next, should receive, as of His Majesty's Royal Bounty, the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, to be paid in Manner thereby directed: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamations, for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards, hath been prolonged and extended to the 30th Day of this instant April; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the said Bounties and Rewards

Rewards should be continued to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy-Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said 30th Day of this instant April to the 31st Day of July next, inclusive. — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Excise-Office, London, May 11, 1779.

ON Saturday last the 16th Instant, about Six o'Clock in the Evening, the Post-Boy was attacked and robbed, at a Place called Priest's Bridge, about Four Miles North of Morpeth, of the whole Scotch Mail, and the Bags from Berwick, Belford, and Alnwick, which should have arrived here this Morning, by Two Footpads, armed with Bludgions, who stopped the Boy, cut the Mails from the Cart, and immediately conveyed the same into a Wood adjoining, of whom no further Description can be given from the Darkness of the Night.
