It was formerly said that the Sieur Gulaenlieu was coming hither from Normay, as yee'we have no account of his being parted from thence; and some begin to think he will not come at all, especially if it be true what is faid of the Duke of Holftein's return ng into the Kings fervice.

From the Duke of Lorrain's Camp at Middenburg, between Diedenhouen and Luxemburg, May 13. After that we had possessed our selves of the French Magazine at Long wy, and removed the Provisions we found there on 300 Wagons, the Duke receiving advice that the Im périal Army was coming down to join us, decamped, and came hither; to morrow we shall remove to Wieler, and there continue a day or two, to provide our felves with all kind of Necessiries, and then continue our march towards Treves, near which City we shall repais the Mofelle, and so join the whole Army.

Strasburgh, May 14. Several parties of Fronch, betweeh 30 and 100 strong, are marched this week to Savernes to finish the demolition of that place, and we, understand that yesterday they began to throw down the walls. At Schleftade they have not for some days workt at all on the Fortifications; and most of the Troops which the Sieur de Monclar had drawn together, are marching with great diligence through Markirkerdal towards Lorrain, to reinforce the Mireschal de Grequi. On the other side, the Imperial Commissaries are providing a great Magazine at Friburg, for the fublishence of

the Troops of the Circles joined with some of the Emperor who are to act in these parts this Summer, and, as it's faid, intend to befrege Brif.c.

Francfort, May 16. The Imperial Forces march in two Bodies towards the Molelle, the one about 12000 strong, under the command of Count Caprara, who prified by this City two or three dayes fince with a Train of Artillery of 36 pieces of Cannon; the other Body his 20000, and has passed the Rhine at Oppenbeim aunder the command of the Commissary General Count Cas-Elieres; when these have joined the Duke of Lorrain,

Cologne, May 18. People cannot but wonder, that not with Handing the feafon is fo far advanced, yet the Ofnabrug Troops continue quiet in their Winter-quarters in this Diocels, and make not as yet any flew of leaving The Neuburg Troops, though they had Orders four or five dayes fince to march, are not yet come to the place appointed for their Rendezvous. From Coblenis we have advice, that the Duke of Lorrgin was come back thither, and had repassed the Moselle in order to his conjunction with the Imperial Tyoops which were on their march, under the command of Count Caprara

and Count Captieres, in two distinct Bodies. The Duke of Lorrain, as he will have a very great and brave Army, lo we expect great matters from him. Nimeguen, May 17, This week several Conferences have been held by the Ministers of the Consederate Princes, as we are informed, about returning their Answer

to the demands of the French and the Sucdes, which, it frems, they have resolved to give in writing to the Medistors, to be by them communicated to the adverse Parties. It is said that my Lord Berkeley, one of His Majesty of Great Britain's Ambassadors, has, upon his humble request, obtained leave to return home, for which he is accordingly disposing himself. The Marquis de los Balbaces, chief of the Spanish Empally is expect-

ed here before the end of this month, Amsterdam, May 21. The News that comes from France of the defeat of our Squadron of Men of War commanded by the Sieur Binches in the West-Indies, did at first very much trouble ur, buzupon a farther examination of what the French themselves write of that Action, and the reports we have here (which, it's faid, come by the way of England) there feems to be ground for us to believe, that the los the French sustained in that Action, does even exceed ours, and that they have no great reason to claim a Victory, especially considering how they were repulsed at Land, and configuently that they failed in their design, which was to have possest themselves of the Island. However we mult have, patience till we have an account from the Sieur Binches of the whole Action, in which he has gained much honour and reputation.
