Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most loyal and affectionate Subjects, the Lieutenant-Governor, Bailiff and Jurats, Dean and Clergy, and other principal Inhabitants of this Island, beg Leave to approach the Foot of your Royal Throne, in this Moment (so important to your Majesty's Kingdoms) of the unjust and unprovoked hostile Declaration of the Court of Spain, when the Heart of every good Subject must beat equally with Indignation and Resentment, as with Zeal and Ardor to strengthen your Majesty's Hands, to add Force and Vigour to the Wisdom of your Councils, and to concur powerfully in every Exertion capable of securing Success to every auspicious Measure planned under your Majesty's propitious Direction, to assure your Majesty, that our Lives and Fortunes shall readily and cheerfully be employed, as well in contributing to resist and repel every hostile Attack, as to fall upon the Foe, and carry that Distress and Desolation in the midst of them, which they have insidiously and perfidiously concerted to bring on your People.

May the same Omnipotent Hand, the great Avenger of Injustice, Treachery, and Perfidy, continue His Blessings upon your Majesty's righteous Endeavors to confound and bring to Naught this wanton and unjust Confederacy; this farther wicked Accession to a mean, undignified Alliance with the Demagogues of Rebellion!
