To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

W. E., your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Lords Spiritual and Temporal in Parliament affembled, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with the most fincere Assurances of our dutiful unshaken Loyalty and steady Attachment to your Majesty's Sacred Person, Family, and Government at all Times, and particularly at this Time of Tryal, when the united Essorts of your Enemies call for the most vigorous Exertions of all

your faithful Subjects.

We return your Majesty our warmest Acknow-ledgment and most grateful Thanks for the Assurances given to us from the Throne, by your Majesty's Command, that the Cares and Solicitudes inseparable from a State of Hostility have not been able to prevent your Majesty from turning your Royal Mind to the Interests and Distresses of this Kingdom with the most affectionate Concern; of which the late Remittanc to this Country for it's Defence, when England had every Reason to apprehend a most formidable and immediate Attack, cannot but be confidered by us as a most convincing Proof, at the same Time that it affords us the pleasing and fatisfactory Manifestation that our Inability and Distress have been truly represented to your Majesty. And with Hearts sull of Graticude we are tensible of your Majesty's great Goodues in affording us also an Assurance, that you will most chearfully co-operate with your Parliaments in such Measures as may promote the common Interests of all your Majesty's Subjects. We therefore think it our Duty, as the Hereditary Counsellors of the Crown, and Guardians of the Rights of our Fellow-Subjects, humbly to represent to your Majesty that the Distresses of your People are such, that a Free Trade is absolutely necessary to enable this Nation to support your Majesty at this important Period with Exertions fuited to it's Zeal and Loyalty, and to preserve it from utter Ruin.

We beg Leave to express to your Majesty our Thankfulness for continuing amongst us a Chief Governor, who, during his Residence with us, hath not only taken unceasing Pains to acquire a thorough Knowledge of the true State and Interest of this Country, but hath afforded us abundant Proof of his sincere good Wishes by his faithful Representa-

tions, and by his unwearied Endeavours to promote and restore the Welfare and Prosperity of this

Kingdom.
We befeech your Majesty to accept our most cordial Congratulation upon the happy Accession to your Royal Family by the Birth of another Prince, which at the same Time that it increases your Majesty's domestic Felicity, tends also to secure the Happiness of your People, by improving and enlarging the flattering Prospect that they have of a Race of Princes descended from your Majesty to

reign over these Kingdoms to the latest Posterity.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that impressed as we are with a deep Sense of the Difficulties which the Trade, Commerce and Manusactures of this Kingdom labour under, that warmed with the Love of our Country, and with a most ardent Zeal for the Honor and Dignity of your Majesty's Crown and Government, we will not fuffer any Dangers with which we may be threatned from Abroad to draw off our Attention from wife and necessary domestic Regulations; and that, amongst the many Subjects worthy of Consideration, the Protestant Charter Schools and the Linen Manufacture recommended to us will have a just Share of our Attention; and we cannot conclude with-out assuring your Majesty from our Hearts, that we shall at all Times be ready to exert ourselves to the utmost in rendering to your Majesty our best and most faithful Services against all your Enemies.
