*Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Sir Peter Parker, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships at Jamaica, to Mr. Stephens, dated at Port Royal, January, 1780.*

**T**HE 25th of November a considerable Body of Spaniards invaded St. Fernando de Omoa, and on the 28th, the Garrison and the Crew of the Porcupine were so reduced by a pestilential Disorder, which raged amongst them, that it became necessary to evacuate the Fort, after having spiked the Guns, and embarked the Ammunition and Stores.

The 8th Instant the Salisbury, commanded by Captain Inglis, brought in here a Spanish Private Ship of War of 50 Guns, named the St. Carlos, commanded by Don Juan Antonio Zavelleta, from Cadiz, bound to Omoa, laden with Brass Cannon, Shot, Musquets, and other Military Stores for the Fort. Captain Inglis has shewn good Conduct and a becoming Spirit as well before as during the Action. Enclosed is his Letter giving an Account of the Action.

The 27th of November last, the Penelope sent in a Spanish Guarda Costa, of 10 Guns and 75 Men, named the Hermosa Mariana.

Captain Luttrell has taken Possession of the Island of Rattan for His Majesty.
