Articles of Capitulation agreed upon and granted between his Excellency Don Bernardo de Galvez, his Catholick Majesty's Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province and Forces of Louisiana, and Alexander Dickson, Esq; Lieutenant-Colonel of the 16th Regiment of Infantry, and Commander of the Troops of His Britannick Majesty upon the Missifippi, Sc. for the Garrison and District of Baton Rouge in West Florida.

Article I.

THE Garrison shall not be made Prisoners of War, nor obliged to engage not to bear Arms for a certain Time.

Article II. But they shall go out with all the Military Honors, Arms, Baggage Horses, Drums beating, Matches lignted at both Ends, Colours flying, Two Pieces Field Artillery, with their Ammunition for Fifty Rounds, and Thirty fix Rounds for the Infantry.

Article III. The Garrifon thall be conveyed as foon as poffible, under a good Efcort and Convoy, to Penfacola, in Spanifh Veffels, either by the Balife, or the Lakes, as it may be thought proper; and the Troops shall be furnished with good and wholefome Provisions for the Passage, at least for Three Weeks, the Veffels and Provisions being first examined and fearched by Commissions being first examined and fearched by Commissions being first examined and fearched by Commissions appointed for that Purpose by Lieutenant Colonel Dickson; and the Charges and Expences shall be repaid on the Debarkation of the Troops at Penfacola.

Article IV. His Excellency Don Bernardo de Galvez fhall provide the Troops with a Veflel of 100 Tons Barthen, or with Two large Boats, which fhall not be fearched; and, in Cafe of Want, with as many more as fhall be found neceflary for conveying the Wounded and Sick, which fhall be able to undergo the Fatigues of the Voyage: And the other Sick and Wounded that cannot be conveyed immediately, fhall be permitted, as foon as they are able, to join their Regiments; and, in the mean Time, his Catholick Majefty fhall furnish them with every Aflistance of which they may ftand in Need.

every Afliftance of which they may find in Need. Anfwer. The Superiority of the Troops under my Command, as well as of Arms, Ammunition, and Provisions, together with the Knowledge I have of the bad Situation in which the Troops and the Fort of Baton Rouge must be, from which all Communication is cut off, having taken every Vessel coming from Penfacola with Troops and Provisions, as well as the armed Veffel Weft Florida, which was their only Protection, and from which Veffels there are already in Town more than 150 Prifoners of War: All this will not permit me to accede to the Proposition of not making Priloners of War the British Troops which are in the Fort of Baton Rouge. I therefore politively require their furrendering themfelves Prifoners of War; but confidering the honor-able Defence made by Lieutenant-Colonel Dickson, his Officers and Troops, they shall go out with Drums beating, Pieces charged, and Colours slying, Five Hundred Paces from the Fort, where they shall deliver the Arms and Colours to the Troops under my Command, and furrender themfelves Prifoners of War; to be exchanged at the Pleafure of the King my Mafter; engaging, at the fame Time, that they shall be treated with Respect and all possible Humanity -The Field Officers shall be permitted to wear their Swords .- The Fort at the Natchez, as depending on this, shall be evacuated and delivered up to me; and the Garrison shall have the Liberty to retire to Penfacola, Jamaica, or fuch other Place under the Government of His Britannick Majefty, as they shall judge proper.

What is contained in the above is to be confidered as my Answer to the ift, 2d, 3d, and 4th Articles.

Article V. All the Baggage and other Effects, belonging to the Officers, Soldiers, and other Perfons of the Garrilon, fhall remain their Property, and be fent with them.

Granted.

Article VI. In cafe any Soldiers, or other armed Perfons, fhall be found in the Garrifon, who have before been in the Service of his Catholick Majefty, and have abfented themfelves without Leave, that Matter fhall not be examined into; but they shall, enjoy the Terms of the Capitulation in as ample a Manner as the others.

Granted.

Article VII. Every Perfon that shall have borne Arms in this Garrifon shall be treated as Part of the Garrifon, whether they are engaged in any Military Corps, or occupy any Employ under His Britannick Majesty, or not.

Being confidered as Part of the Garrifon, they fhall be Prifoners of War, referving to myself the Right to grant Liberty (to those who are not Soldiers) or to enlift them if I think proper.

Article VIII. All the Negroes that fhall be found in the Garrison shall be delivered to their Masters, as also all the Slaves taken or retaken since the Commencement of Hostilities between the Crowns of Spain and Great Britain in these Environs.

Granted. Article IX. The Inhabitants of this Diffrict fhall be under the fame Laws, and enjoy the fame Privileges and Immunities of Religion and Judicature, and fhall have the fame Magistrates as they had under the English Government, at least till the

Peace shall be re-established. Granted in every Point that shall not be contrary to our Laws, until the Decision of the King my Master is known.

Article X. The Inhabitants shall, in like Manner, be kept in full and entire Posses of all their Effects and Slaves, and in short of every Thingthat belongs to them.

Granted.

Article XI. All the Cattle and other Provisions taken from the Inhabitants for the Troops of his Catholick Majefty shall be paid for, without Deduction, according to the established Price of such Articles in Louisiana.

Granted, provided they shall produce sufficient. Proofs.

Article XII. All the Inhabitants who fhall prefer quitting the Country or Diftrict, in order to eftablift themfelves in fome Part of the Dominions of His Britannick Majefty, fhall be provided with a Pafiport for their Perfons, Families and Effects, and they fhall be permitted to remain without being difturbed or obliged to take the Oath of Fidelity to his Catholick Majefty.

Granted, in respect to the Liberty of retiring; but they shall be obliged to take the Oath of Fidelity during their Residence in the Jurisdiction of his Catholick Majesty.

his Catholick Majefty. Article XIII. The Effects moveable or immoveable, whether of Military or other Perfons abfent or prefent, fhall remain their Property, and they fhall have the Right to fell or dispose of them, as they fhall judge proper.

Granted.

Article XIV. There shall not be the least Insult offered to the Troops of the Garrison by the Befiegers; and the Savages, Mulattoes, and Negroes shall be particularly prevented from infringing this. Stipulation.
