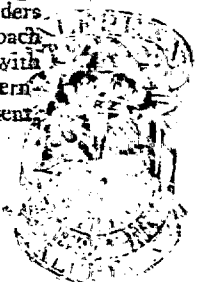

The Bread is to be made of the Flour of good marketable English Wheat, out of which the first Bran is to be taken, by Means of an Eight Shilling Cloth; each Soldier's Allowance of this Bread for Four Days being a well-baked Loaf weighing Six Pounds.

The Ration of Dry Wood is to consist of Twelve Pounds, being likewise the Allowance of each Man for Four Days.

The Truss of good Wheaten Straw, must weigh Thirty-six Pounds.

The Ration of Forage is to consist of Eighteen Pounds of good old Meadow Hay, and Eight Pounds of Oats.

All the above Articles, except the Bread, are to be deposited in Magazines at the several Camps, wherever they may be, and the Contractor is to deliver the Supplies to the General Officers at their respective Quarters.

The Carriage of the Bread from the different Bakers (which are always to be as near as possible to the Camps) will be defrayed by Government.

N. B. It will be expected that the Contractor shall have a Sufficiency of Flour, and of all the Articles in the Magazines, for Sixteen Days Supply, till he shall be ordered to the contrary.

The Proposals are to be delivered, sealed up, and directed to either of their Lordships Secretaries, any Time on or before the 24th Instant.
