Dublin, June 6, 1780.

Yesterday being the Day appointed for celebrating His Majesty's Birth-Day, the Flag was displayed on Bedford Tower; the Great Guns at the Salute Battery, in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix, were fired three Rounds, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out in the Royal Square at the Barracks. At Noon there was a very numerous Assembly of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, at the Castle, who appeared in extraordinary Splendor, to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode set to Music was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency to the Ladies; and at Night there were Bonfires, and other Demonstrations of Joy.
