joseph Weston is about 23 Years of Age, 5 Feet o Inches high, slender made, of a fair and smooth Complexion, genteel Person, has grey Eyes, and large Nose with a Scar upon it, his Hair is of a light brown Colour, sometimes tied behind, at other times loose and curled, his Voice strong, and he fpeaks a little through his Nose; bas a remarkable

finall Hand and long Fingers.
