We cannot fufficiently express the lively Senfe we entertain of your Majefty's gracious Intentions towards this Kingdom, the Wildom and found Po-licy of your Majefty's Councils, and the Juffice of the British Legislature, in having concurred to remove the Caufes of the Difcontents and Jealoufies expreffed in the late Addreffes prefented to your Mjaefty; which Measures, we assure your Majesty, have most effectually answered the Purposes intended thereby, and, when accomplifhed, will gratify the utmost Wishes of your Majesty's faithful Subjects of this Kingdom.

We request your Majesty will accept our warmest Congratulations upon the important and decifive Victory gained by your Majefly's Fleets over those of the common Enemy in the West Indies, and the fignal Advantages obtained by your Majesty's Arms in the Island of Ceylon, and upon the Coast of Coromandel; Succeffes which will teach your Ma-jetty's Enemies, that the Justice of your Cause, supported by the Valour of your People, will defeat those dangerous Combinations which they have formed against the Liberties of Mankind, and will tend to promote that most defireable Object, a permanent and honourable Peace.

We are well convinced that your Majesty, re-garding all your Subjects with one and the fame paternal Affection, and confidering their mutual Interefts as infeparably connected and united, will at all Times exercife your Royal Prerogative in fuch a Manner as may be most conducive to their Welfare

We receive with Gratitude your Majefty's molt gracious Declaration, that you will give your Royal Affent to fuch Acts as may be necessary to prevent the Suppreffion of Bills in the Privy Council of this Kingdom, and the Alteration of them any where; and to an Act to limit the Duration of the Act for the better Regulation and Accommodation of your Majefty's Forces in this Kingdom to the Term of Two Years.

We beg Leave to affure your Majefly, that we are fully fentible of the Magnanimity of your Majefly, and of the Wildom of your Parliament of Great Britain, in feconding your Majefty's most gracious In-tentions to this Kingdom, without any Stipulation or Condition whatfoever; and that your Majefty may have the firmeft Reliance upon the Good Faith, Generofity, and Honor of this Nation; that as it is their undoubted Interest, so it is their warmest Wifh, to promote and perpetuate the Harmony, Sta-bility, and Glory of the British Empire; and that the fame Spirit, which induced them to affert their Right to thare the Freedom of Great Britain, will confirm them in a Determination to share her. Fate allo, flanding and falling with the British Nation.
