very glorious and brilliant Successes of your Ma-  
jesty's Fleets and Armies; the Wishes nearest our  
Hearts are the Glory of Great Britain, and an  
indissoluble and perpetual Connection between her  
and this Kingdom.

May your Majesty long, very long reign over  
a happy and an united People, is the fervent Prayer  
of us, who are with all Duty and Loyalty your  
Majesty's most faithful Subjects.
